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

How to Use the Blue Book when Touring

The following maps and indexes are provided in each volume of the Blue Book. They are designed to act as short cuts in finding the information you desire.

Index of Towns and Cities (Pages 14 to 72).

Alphabetical list of cities and towns with key to their location on large general index map (Page 7) front of book. Populations, hotels and garages. Outgoing routes, points of interest, and references to street maps are also given for the larger towns and cities. Use the key (letter and number) to locate a town on large index map.

General Index Map (Page 7).

Folded Inside Front Cover

Shows all towns, route numbers, and routes that are covered by running directions in the text matter.

Route Chart (Page 4).

This condensed chart aids you to quickly locate Blue Book routes with their numbers and mileage, and is published for reference when planning long tours, and for quick general reference purposes.

Volume Chart (Pages 756-757).

Shows that portion of United States and Canada covered by each volume of the Blue Book, with the volume number.

How to Find Your Destination, Location and the Road to Travel

When you wish to find the route directions between any two towns:

(1) Town and City Index. Refer to Pages 14 to 72 for the location of your starting point or destination. Key will refer you to their approximate position on the map. (2) General Index Map (Page 7). This map will show you all the routes between two given points. Select the route you wish to take. The number on the route selected with arrow pointing in the direction you wish to go is your Route Number and refers you to the

(3) Running Directions in the body of the book. You will find the "Route Numbers" at the top of each page.

In Planning Long Tours

Route Chart (Page 4).

Route Numbers and arrowheads, with distances between terminals, will be found on the Route Chart and may be used in exactly the same way as the General Index Map. For Volume Number, information on adjacent territory, see Page 756.

How to Use the Running Directions

The "Running Directions" are the printed text matter describing each route. Two columns of figures are shown on the left side of each page of text matter (Running Directions). The outside column shows the total or accumulated mileages from the *starting point of the route* to any point on the route. The inside column shows the mileage between two adjacent or consecutive points or towns.

Blue Book users will find an improved arrangement of indexes in this Volume. The list of cities and towns, Hotels and Garages and all routes, under terminals, are combined on the pages following the folded General Index Map, in the Index section (front of book).

Town names with an asterisk (*) appear only on the enlarged Index Map of the New York City Section. (Page 5 of the General Index Map.)


List of Routes is noted under Route Terminals and important towns.



Hotels, Garages and Other Advertisers are listed here under their respective cities or towns, with their addresses and reference to pages where their advertisements will be found.





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In this suggestion to motorists regarding New York City and vicinity, Columbus Circle, the intersection of Broadway, Eighth Avenue, and 59th Street, is the center from which radiate lines of travel as follows:

1. Through the northern part of Manhattan, the Bronx, points on Long Island Sound, and points in the Hudson Valley and lower Croton watershed.

2. Through the southern part of Manhattan to Staten Island and the south-western section of Brooklyn.

3. To the west across the ferries leading to northern, central and southern

parts of New Jersey. 4. To the east over the bridges, which form the gateways to northeastern Brooklyn, the resorts on the south shore, adjacent to Brooklyn, and all points in the central and western part of Long Island, and along the western section of the north shore.

#### Northern Manhattan, Western Bronx

To reach the northwestern part of Manhattan, the lower western part of the Bronx, and points near the east shore of the Hudson, as far as Yonkers and beyond, it is possible to take one of several routes from Columbus Circle.

Possibly the most popular and the one which usually has the best road surface is to follow Broadway to 72nd Street, turn west to Riverside and follow this to 155th Street (be-yond Trinity Cemetery) and there continue to bear left along Riverside Drive to Dyckman bear left along Riverside Drive to Dyckman Street, which is the junction of the drive and Broadway. The latter may be followed directly through Yonkers and to points be-yond, or tourists may turn left at 230th Street after crossing the Harlem River Ship Canal, and bear left and right up Riverdale Avenue, along the top of a ridge which over-looks the Vale of Yonkers on the right, and drong down on the west to the edge of the drops down on the west to the edge of the Hudson River. This avenue is also a good route through Yonkers, and avoids, by bearing left, the congested corner in that city known as Getty Square.


Those who wish to reach the Grand Boulevard, Jerome and Sedgwick Avenues, which are the direct lines running through the western part of the Bronx, may leave Columbus Circle and follow Broadway, or Riverside Drive, to 145th Street, where there is a right turn crossing the bridge over the Harlem into 149th Street, the Bronx. At the top of the hill turn to the left on Mott Avenue and into the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, which continues to Mosholu Parkway. To reach Jerome Avenue from the Circle,

the most direct route is to follow the west drive of Central Park from Columbus Circle, and at the northwestern gate of the Park, which leads to Central Park West (Eighth Avenue), continue to bear right one block further east, inside the Park to Seventh Ave-nue, then left out of the Park and follow Seventh Avenue to its end at 153rd Street; there turn left and next right across the Central Bridge over the Harlem and follow Jerome Avenue to its intersection with the Grand Concourse at Mosholu Parkway.

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Sedgwick Avenue, which is the most western of the through thoroughfares in the west part of the Bronx, but which is not always in good condition over its entire length, may be reached by the Jerome Avenue route by turning aharp left after crossing the bridge 155th Street, on to Sedgwick Avenue.

There is a pleasant variation from Riverside Drive for those bound from 155th Street to Dyckman Street, along the Hudson. At 159th Street and Broadway turn left on Fort Washington Avenue, and follow to its northern terminus, which winds to the right down Abbey Hill and into Broadway at the west base of Fort George.

Van Cortlandt Park, which is the northern end of the section just described, may be reached from the Concourse on its east, or Broadway, on its west. Those who enter the Park from Broadway may turn to the right at the end of the subway structure, which at that point is an elevated road, and continue to the overhead crossing of the Putnam Division of the New York Central. West of the tracks is a turn left, to the old Van Cortlandt mansion, or the tourist may continue under the tracks and the golf course, and on to Yonkers through the upper woods of the park. About midway of the golf course in the Park is a turn to the right up the hill to Jerome Avenue. There is another road leading east to Jerome Avenue from the lower end of the golf course.

There are numerous points of interest in this section, beginning with Central Park at the edge of Columbus Circle, where there is a collection of animals called the Central Park Zoo. The Metropolitan Museum has the most noted art collection in America, and may be reached by turning east out of the Park onto Fifth Avenue at Miner's Gate (79th Street).

At 77th Street and Central Park West is the Museum of Natural History. On Riverside Drive between 72nd and Grant's Tomb are the residences of many wealthy and well known people. Broadway as far south as commbus Circle, and below, was an Indian trail, and was opened as a Kings Highway by the British about 1703 and called Queen Ann's Road. It was eventually extended as far north as Albany, making it one of the oldest highways of more than one hundred miles in the United States.


Practically all of the ancient houses between the Harlem River and Columbus Circle in this western section have been torn down, except one at 204th Street and Broadway, known as the Dyckman house, and recently restored. It is the oldest farmhouse on Manhattan Island.

Near 181st Street and Fort Washington Avenue was Fort Washington. On what was until recently a part of the estate of C. K. G. Billings, now owned by a corporation, in which the Rockefellers are interested, is the site of Fort Tryon, the last stand made by the Continental Army on the Island of Manhattan before the retreat to White Plains. Beyond this point and beyond where Washington Road turns down Abbey Hill is a promontory (reached by a poor road) affording a magnificent view of the Hudson and the Palisades, probably the best on the lower part of the river. On this point the white settlers maintained a lookout for approaching Indiana, and it was also a signal point during the Revolution.

Fort George, formerly an amusement resort, lies to the east of Broadway, opposite Washington Heights, and is quite as historic as the latter, although its historic landmarks have been largely obliterated by modern improvements. At the northeast base of Fort George runs the Harlem River Speedway, where the wealthy owners of trotters and pacers congregated on afternoons, prior to the coming of the automobile, and had lively brushes with their animals, often with large sums at stake. There are still a few devotees to this sport, but their ranks are rapidly thinning, and it will doubtless be thrown open to motor traffic in the near future. The western end of the Speedway is a part of Dyckman Street.

Trinity Cemetery, at Broadway and 155th Street, is owned by Trinity Church, which stands at the head of Wall Street, and is one of the most historic burying grounds of the east. The cemetery, until later years, cut Broadway at this point, and it was with diffi-

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culty that the city obtained the right to build a thoroughfare through it. Riverside Drive, which skirts it on the west, is built on a steel viaduct at a large cost, to avoid disturbing the graves.

#### Northeastern Manhattan and Bronx

To reach the northeastern part of Manhattan and the Bronx there is not a great variety of good roads. From Columbus Circle the tourist may follow the East Drive in the Park, which is equally as good as the West Drive, or up Fifth Avenue to 110th Street; from there it is desirable to use Seventh Avenue to 145th Street, turn right over the bridge and east, up the hill, to Mott Avenue, then along the Grand Concourse to Fordham Road, turning to the right and following into Pelham Parkway, at the beginning of which is the Zoological Gardens, on the south, and the Botanic Gardens on the north. In the Botanic Garden grounds is the original Lorillard mansion and site of the snuff mill where the foundation of the family fortune was made. The Parkway leads through Pelham Manor, which was the seat of Lord Pell, a manorial lord prior to the Revolution.

The Bronx is very extensive, and has many good roads, but is not particularly interesting to the casual visitor aside from the line which has been described.

#### Southern Manhattan

For several years it has been more difficult to reach the section south of Columbus Circle, particularly on the west side, than any other part of the city, but subway improvements are rapidly drawing to a close, and Broadway and Seventh Avenue, which form direct lines south from the Circle, may be improved as to surface during the summer of 1917. On Sunday, Broadway makes a desirable

On Sunday, Broadway makes a desirable thoroughfare to the Battery, as there is little traffic, but on week days the stranger visiting New York will find Seventh Avenue (if the surface has been restored) the better and more direct route. It may be followed to Canal Street, and from there south all streets are congested, but West Broadway and Church Street usually offer the quickest road to the Battery, where there is a ferry to Staten Island.

There are good roads through Staten Island to another ferry connecting with the Jersey coast and the direct shore road to south Jersey seashore resorts, Lakewood, etc.

#### Southwestern Brooklyn and Shore Resorts

Those who wish to go over the Williamsburg Bridge into southwestern Brooklyn, or to the neighborhood of Coney Island, will find Broadway to 14th Street usable on Sundays,

and on week days it is best to use Madison Avenue to 23rd Street and Fourth Avenue to Cooper Square; then down the Bowery to Delancey Street, then east over the Williamsburg

Bridge, and right into Taylor Street and Bedford Avenue, for Coney Island and neighboring resorts.

At Bedford Avenue and Eastern Parkway there is an option of routes to Coney Island. One is via Bedford Avenue and into the Coney Island Boulevard, at the southeastern end of Prospect Park. The other is west from Bedford Avenue and Eastern Parkway into the Park at the Plaza Gate and through the winding drives of the Park to the entrance of Coney Island Avenue.

The same route, as far as the Williams-burg bridge, should be employed to reach the Manhattan Bridge, continuing beyond Delancey Street to Canal Street, the entrance to Manhattan Bridge. This bridge leads into Flatbush Avenue, Brooklyn, which runs di-

Ferries to All New Jersey

Tourists bound for New Jersey will find of them lead through shabby streets with rough pavements on the Jersey shore, but nevertheless cannot be avoided in going to certain towns. The Christopher, Desbrosses and Cortlandt Street ferries, as just noted, do not lead to desirable thoroughfares on the Jersey side. The 23rd Street ferry to 14th Street, Hoboken, is not particularly desirable on account of the Jersey end, but it may be em-ployed to save time in going to Newark and points southwest of that city.

The 42nd Street ferry to Weehawken is preferable, of the so-called downtown fer-

History of Lower Manhattan

While cruising around, the lower historic section of Manhattan is interesting, if the traveler has time to stop and inspect the points of interest. It requires patience to make the excursion satisfactorily. To many visitors the skyscrapers are of interest, but they are too numerous to describe here in detail; the mention of only a few may serve to stimulate the interest of the traveler to a closer study of these marvelous structures.

The greatest of these artificial "peaks," which form the canyons of the most talked of commercial district in the world, is the Wool-worth Building, at Broadway and Park Place, 51 stories high, and rising 750 feet from the level of the street, the tallest inhabited struc-ture ever built by man. The Singer Building

The latter leads into what is known as the Englewood approach, which is a 6 per cent grade, of modern vitrified brick, a mile and a quarter up the Palisades. On warm days it is likely to give a heavily loaded car, particularly one of long wheel base, a stiff pull, as there are two hairpin turns.

from its basement. The Park Row Building, opposite the old Post Office, is 552 feet from its foundation to flagstaff. The Equitable Building, opposite Trinity Church, is the largest office building,

in point of floor space, in the world. The land upon which No. 1 Wall Street is erected sold for \$576 a square foot, a record price in New York realty.

One or two of the larger structures in this district contain more than twenty million cubic feet of space. The amount of glass used varies according to the shape of the building, and sometimes exceeds 200,000 square feet. In a few of the larger ones there are more than thirty-five miles of steam pipes, twenty-five

miles of plumbing, and seventy-five miles of picture molding, and a few have 7000 doors each, and employ more than 12,000 electric lights, supplying as many as 4000 offices and housing a population of 12,000 people.

The effect of this enormous concentration of steel in a small area is so strong it frequently waries the points of the compasses on boats in the harbor as much as seven degrees.

In the historic inner harbor off the Battery are the famous Statue of Liberty, presented to the United States by the French Government; Ellis Island, where the immigrants land; Governor's Island, the headquarters of the Army in the East; historic Castle William; and off Staten Island is Robbins Reef Lighthouse.

On the Battery is an interesting and wellkept Aquarium, occupying a circular building dating from 1812, when it was Fort Clinton, used to defend the city against the British; later it was Castle Garden, an amusement resort, where Lafayette was tendered a reception in 1824, and where there were receptions to the early Presidents, also to the Prince of Wales. Jenny Lind sang there under the direction of P. T. Barnum, in 1850, and it was used as a Federal Government immigration station from 1855 to 1890, when Ellis Island was established.

Island was established. Near the Battery, at Bowling Green, is a new Federal custom house, which cost \$4,-500,000, standing on the site of Fort Amsterdam (1620).

Bowling Green was established as a park by the English Government in 1732; was the scene of a public demonstration against the Stamp Act, 1775; in 1776, when the act was repealed, an equestrian statue of King George was ordered from Europe and erected by the citizens of New York; following the Declaration of Independence it was torn down by them, together with the surrounding fence, which contained miniature crowns. The statue was abipped to Litchfield, Conn., molded into bullets, and it was estimated that five hundred British soldiers were killed by them.

The first Trinity Church at the head of Wall Street was built in 1697; destroyed by fire, rebuilt, torn down and the present structure erected in 1846. It is the richest church society in the United States, and enjoys an income from its properties of more than a million dollars a year. Many noted men and women are buried in its yard, and one of the most curious "graves" is of Charlotte Temple, a fictitious character in Mrs. Rowson's "Tale of Truth," 1790. The Martyrs' Monument was erected to the American prisoners who died in New York prisons in the Revolution. Captain Lawrence (war of 1812), Commander of the Chesapeake, who during the fight with the Shannon, said, "Don't give up the ship," Alexander Hamilton and others are buried there.

In the Wall Street district the principal point of interest is the Stock Exchange, which contains a thousand members, and in which seats have been sold for more than \$100,000. There is also the Consolidated Exchange at Broad and Beaver, and the Curb Market, held unsheltered, in Broad Street in all kinds of weather; the banking house of J. P. Morgan, the Sub-Treasury, which stands upon the site of the old capitol of the province, which was later Federal Government Hall, where the first Congress was held, and where Washington took the oath of office, April 30, 1789. A statue of him, in front of the building rests upon a stone upon which he stood in the building when he was sworn.

The building is now the greatest repository of gold in the world. It is supposed to be self-protective, and has steel doors with port holes and an arsenal within, and on the roof is fitted with turrets from which guns could be fired.

Further south on Wall Street is the National City Bank in a building which was the old Federal custom house. Nearby, on Cedar and Broadway, is the New York Clearing House, and on Liberty Street the Chamber of Commerce, which dates from 1768.

Commerce, which dates from 1768. At Broad and Pearl Streets is Fraunce's Tavern, restored, where Washington bade farewell to his army. West Street and South Street, both starting

West Street and South Street, both starting at the Battery, one along the North River and the other along the East River, contain the wharves and piers, and bind together the wholesale and banking district. On South Street and Coenties Slip is the Seamen's Institute, an interesting sailor's home, which is capped by the Titanic Lighthouse, a memorial to the ill-fated steamship "Titanic." This institute broke the backbone of the sailors' boarding house system which once thrived along South and West Streets and robbed "Jack Tar."

Further uptown, near the old Post Office, on Broadway and Vesey Street, is St. Paul's Church (1766), the only church in New York saved from the Revolution. Among the early worshippers were Lord Howe, King George IV, when a midshipman, and George Washington, who repaired there after taking the oath of office in Wall Street and attended service.

#### North of the City Hall

In City Hall Park are the old City Hall, considered a fine example of early architecture; the new Municipal Building, which towers above its historic forefather; the Hall of Records, on Chambers Street, and the entrance to Brooklyn Bridge, opened in 1883, and which cost more than \$25,000,000. On the east is Park Row, which leads into the Bowery at Chatham Square, several blocks to the north. The Bowery was once famed for its dives, but though still interesting, has lost much of its former ill repute, a tame and uninteresting place. Off Chatham Square is Chinatown, and Petl, Mott and Doyers Streets, always appeal to the visitor.

Further north on Broadway and 10th Street is picturesque Grace Church, with its openair pulpit. On 14th Street and Broadway is Union Square, now largely used as an openair forum, where divers doctrines are delivered. It is a favorite spot with the Socialists.

To the west of Broadway, at 4th Street, is Washington Square, around which clusters the downtown artistic colony of Manhattan and in which is a statue of Garibaldi, the shrine of the Manhattan Italians; and Washington Arch. a creation by Stanford White. This section was originally Captain Robert Richard Randall's farm. He left the property, now immemsely valuable, for the support of Sailors' Snug Harbor, a sailors' home on Staten Island. It yields a rental of nearly \$1,000,000 a year.

It yields a rental of nearly \$1,000,000 a year. East of Broadway, at 8th Street, are Bible House and Cooper Square, where stands the Cooper Institute.

Further north, at 23rd Street and Broadway, is Madison Square, containing Madison Square Garden by Stanford White and capped with a bronze Diana by Saint Gaudens; on the east side, also at 25th Street, is the artistic white building occupied by the Appellate Division of the New York Supreme Court. At the south-west corner of the Square is the Flatiron Building are of the south which the south west corner of the Square is the Flathon Building, one of the early architectural towers of the central business section. On 29th Street, east of Fifth Avenue, is "The Little Church Around the Corner." At 34th Street and Broadway is Herald Square with the Herald Building, also by Stanford White containing pictureance strik.

Stanford White, containing picturesque striking clocks. Fifth Avenue, now said to be the most

fashionable business street in the world, re-quires a directory of its own and several are

published, covering it from Washington Square to 110th Street.

In the newer and upper part of Manhattan is Cathedral Heights, facing Cathedral Park-way (110th Street), at the foot of Morningside Park. The Cathedral of St. John the Divine was started by the late Bishop Potter, and is designed to be the greatest cathedral in Amer-ica, and will require many more years for completion.

On the east side of the Concourse, near the corner of 192nd Street, north of Fordham Road, is the Edgar Allan Poe Cottage, where the melancholy poet lived with his invalid wife and wherein he wrote "Annabell Lee" and other poems.

On the crest of a hill in outskirts, Osborne Memorial Home for Old Ladies; Post Road Inn (1751) Gen. Howe's Headquarters when pursuing Washington after battle of Long Island.

[5^{*}] Ryg, N. Y.—On Long Island Sound. Christ's Eiscopal Church, near the center of the town, owns a silver chalice presented by Queen Anne. James Fenimore Cooper worshipped there later. On the site of the town hall a tavern stood as early as 1731. Washington and Lafayette stopped there. John Jay was buried in the Jay Cemetery, on the Post Road. Ophir Farm, estate of the late Whitelaw Reid, is on Purchase Street.







The Byram River was a boundary line between the Dutch and English for many years; the Indians called it "Buy-rum," and it was doubtless a place where they bought rum.

[6*] GEREN WICH, CONN.-Settled 1640; many old houses; Gen. Israel Putnam's house on northern side East Putnam Ave.; "Boss Bill" Tweed's home, "Milbank," opposite soldiers' monument on post road; flight of stone steps, on "Put's" Hill, restored; legend is General Putnam, who had been out turkey-trotting, with Mistress Bush, was a late riser following morning; while the shaving soap was still on his face, he was surprised by British, and fled down steps upon white horse, with lather on his face and coat-tails flying to the breeze, but he made his escape, and lived to fight another day. Greenwich on highest point of land on Atlantic coast, south of Maine, with exception of Atlantic Highland, N. J., prides itself on harboring more millionaires than any other city of similar size; Belle Haven section known as the "Zoo," because so many Wall Street "bears" and "bulls" reside there; estate of E. C. Benedict, and many modern residences; Indian Harbor home of Indian Harbor Yacht Club; Bruce Art Museum built by a well known cotton merchant.







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

Neck, a seaside, residential place. [9°] DARIEN, CONN.—Band of Tories, from New York, raided Congressional Church (Sun-day, July 22d, 1781), after a fight captured congregation, marched them to Brooklyn, N. Y., threw them into prison, where they suf-fered for months; athletic young patriot attempted to jump out of the window; spent most of incarceration picking birdshot out of anatomy. To east is Tokeneke, musical and literary colony.







[2*] HASTINGS-ON-HUDSON, N. Y.—In the river opposite is Indian Head, highest point of the Palisades. A small but highly victorious battle, from the Continental Army's stand-point, took plage at Hastings, Sept. 30, 1778. While it is not mentioned by all historians, it is well extended. After the bettle of Mark is well authenticated. After the battle of Mon-mouth, N. J., June 29, 1778, Washington moved back to the neighborhood of White Plains. On the morning of September 30 a detachment of Pennsylvania Continentals, commanded by Col. Richard Butler, was in the neighborhood of Hastings, and learned from Peter Post, an innkeeper, that a band of Hessians and British were on their way from Yonkers. The Americans immediately decided to ambush them, and concealed themselves in a cedar grove, now a part of the estate of F. C. Zinsser. When they were fired upon near Edgar's Lane the British troops dismounted and made a stand. but were quickly driven down a ravine into the Hudson, where many of them drowned; others escaped along the river bank to Yonkers. At this time Jeremiah Dobbs, from whom Dobbs Ferry takes its name, ran a ferry across the river to Molly Sneeden's Landing, near the village of Piermont.

[3*] DOBBS FERRY, N. Y.—A Revolutionary fighting ground, frequently mentioned in maneuvers of Continental and British armies: Livingston Manor Washington's headquarters (1783) and meeting place between Washington and Sir Guy Carlton for the arrangement of terms of peace. The room where the papers were signed is still preserved, with same furniture used on historic occasion. General Lafayette's table may also be seen in house; in front of the house is Washington-Rochambeau monument, commemorating meeting of Washington and French allies. The Misses Masters' School, located there, home of Bob Ingersoll, noted agnostic. Jeremiah Dobbs, Swede, went there from Delaware, and he and his descendants ran a ferry for one hundred years. Locality was part of Philipse Manor, the headquarters of which is now a museum, in Yonkers. British occoupied Dobbs Ferry and Washington camped there July 4th, 1781. Nearby: "Nevis," built by son of Alexander Hamilton, named after his father's birthplace in the West Indies; Ardsley Golf Club to the east.





Riga are several old iron mines, and an ancient furnace stands by the side of a tumbling brook. This country prior to Revolution was called "This wigwam place" by the Indians, and was on the trail between the Stookbridge Indian settle-ments and those near the village of Kent.

Early white settlers were Dutch, followed by Puritans. First iron forge in the community, opened 1734; thirty years later another was opened by Ethan Allen. The iron ore was so rich there was a stampede from various parts of the country and for a time the land was in a boom. Workmen came from Russia and Switzerland, which accounts for many of the Rusian and Swiss names today. Alexander Hamilton went there to study engineering. Copper was found in the hills, and the first U. S. copper money was made from it; the works having been taken over by the government. The cannon for the frigate "Constitu-tion" was cast from these ores and General Knox was in charge of the works. Many ex-perts thought the mineral deposits were the most important in the country, but later larger discoveries elsewhere overshadowed them. discoveries elsewhere Nearby: Twin Lake, Ashley Falls and Lake Dunmore.

Views of Greylock to north; Taconic Mountains to west; the Dome to south; Stockbridge Bowl three miles distant; Shadow Brook was home of Anson Phelps Shadow Brook was home of Anson Phelps Stokes, owned by Spencer Shotter. Among the residents: Charles Lanier, railroad di-rector, William D. Sloane, Henry H. Cook, Giraud Foster, Mrs. Alfred Vanderbilt, the Goelets, Robert W. Patterson, Morris K. Jes-up, Joseph W. Burden, George H. Morgan and F. A. Schermerhorn; Lenox Golf Club notable gathering place for world's distin-guished devotees of the game; Lenox Academy, founded 1803, one of most exclusive schools in the world for small children; Catharine Sedgwick, first American woman novelist, and Sedgwick, hrst American woman novelist, and her brother Charles entertained literary lions of their time, including Lowell, Holmes, Sum-ner, Channing, Bryant, Hawthorne; Jenny Lind, "Swedish Nightingale," was married there. In the "little red house," Hawthorne Road, Hawthorne wrote "The House of Seven Gables" and "The Wonder Book." The cli-terate end end by more the subject mate, now enjoyed by many, was the subject of violent ravings, on the part of Hawthorne, who said "There was never ten minutes when it was not either too hot or too cold, the result of which was a miserable disturbance of one's system." He hated the community thoroughly and hoped somebody would lay the mountains flat. The wealthy did not begin to migrate to Lenox until the Court House was moved to Pittsfield.



Y.—One of the earliest settlements along Hudson; name derived from Dutch "Younker;" Phillipse Manor House, now museum, built 1682, with front added 1745, excellent specimen of Colonial archi-tecture; Mary Phillipse refused hand of Washington; property confiscated during Revolution, as Frederick Phillipse, then owner, was loyal-ist; Manor Lord Phillipse had 100 servants in bouse and owned property for many miles north.

[2°] HASTINGS-ON-THE-HUDSON, N. Y.-In the river opposite is Indian Head, highest point of the Palisades. A small but highly victorious battle, from the Continental Army's standpoint, took place at Hastings, Sept. 30, 1778. While it is not mentioned by all historians, it is well authenticated. After the battle of Monmouth, N. J., June 29, 1778, Washington moved back to the neighborhood of White Plains. On the morning of September 30 a detachment of Pennsylvania Continentals, commanded by Col. Richard Butler, was in the neighborhood of Hastings, and learned from Peter Post, an inn-keeper, that a band of Hessians and British were on their way from Yonkers. The Americans immediately decided to ambush them, and concealed themselves in a cedar grove, now a part of the estate of F. C. Zinsser. When they were fired upon near Edgar's Lane the British troops dismounted and made a stand, but were quickly driven down a ravine into the

Hudson, where many of them drowned; others escaped along the river bank to Yonkers. At this time Jeremiah Dobbs, from whom Dobbs Ferry takes its name, ran a ferry across the river to Molly Sneeden's Landing, near the village of Piermont. [3*] DOBBS FERRY, N. Y.--A Revolutionary

fighting ground, frequently mentioned in ma-nœuvers of Continental and British armies; Livingston Manor Washington's headquarters (1783) and meeting place between Washington and Sir Guy Carlton for the arrangement of terms of peace. The room where the papers were signed is still preserved, with same furniture used on historic occasion. General Lafayette's table may also be seen in houss; in front of the house is Washington-Rocham-Washington and French alliea. The Misses Masters' School, located there, home of Bob Ingersoll, noted agnostic. Jeremiah Dobba, Swede went there for the school and the school agnostic. Swede, went there from Delaware, and he and his descendants ran a ferry for one hundred years. Locality was part of Phillipse Manor, the headquarters of which is now a museum, in Yonkers. British occupied Dobbs Ferry and Washington camped there July 4, 1781. Nearby: "Nevis," built by son of Alexander Hamilton, named after his father's birthplace in the West Indies; Ardsley Golf Club to the cast.





Later André made an attempt to cross the Hudson at Kings Ferry

and reach New York by land, which resulted in his capture.





He never learned much about farming, although he used his experience to answer farming questions in his paper. One of his gentle readers inquired if Paris Green was good to put on potatoes, and Horace replied that it might be "for those whose taste were vitiated by rum and tobacco, but that he preferred ham gravy." He died at the home of Dr. Choate near his farm, Nov. 29, 1872. The original house was burned, but a later one. on the site, is occupied by his daughter.



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## Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

Settled by Dutch; named from an Indian village called "Ape-keep-suick," meaning "Safe Harbor." Seat of Vassar College, which occupies 400 acres and is the largest women's college in the U. S.; founded by Matthew Vassar, an Englishman, 1861. The New York Legislature met at Poughkeepsie many years during the latter part of the 18th century and the federal constitution was ratified there in State convention. A cantilever railroad bridge across the Hudson, built 1886; it is a mile and a quarter long.

[6*] HASTINGS-ON-THE-HUDSON, N. Y.---A small but highly victorious battle, from the Continental Army's standpoint, took place at Hastings, Sept. 30, 1778. Richard Butler was in the neighborhood of Hastings, and learned from Peter Post, an inn-keeper, that a band of Hessians and British were on their way from Yonkers. The Americans immediately decided to ambush them, and concealed themselves in a cedar grove, now a part of the estate of F. C. Zinsser. When they were fired upon near Edgar's Lane, the British troops dismounted and made a stand, but were quickly driven down a ravine into the

ALBANY, N. Y.—One of the oldest cities in the United States, settled by the Dutch in 1623.

Long before Hendrick Hudson sailed up the Hudson, the French, working down from Can-ada, had established a trading post at the point where the ancient Indian trail started from the present site of Albany through the Mohawk Valley to the St. Lawrence River, the lakes of central and western New York, and Niagara.

Dutch, Huguenot and English regimes succeeded each other; and the name changed in turn from Fort Nassau to Beverwyck, to Fort Orange and finally to Albany,

Gradually the place grew in importance, especially as a center for travel and transportation from Manhattan or New England to the interior.

Albany was the meeting place of the first Provincial Congress, held 1754, to formulate a plan for a union of the several colonies.

It was also the key to the primitive highways to central and northern New York, which the French and Indian and Revolutionary wars brought into new importance; during both conflicts military expeditions frequently passed through en route to Lake George, Lake Champlain, Canada, Lake Ontario and the Niagara frontier.

Burgoyne's expedition of 1777 was directed primarily against Albany, which he hoped to capture with the aid of forces from Oswego and New York, and crush the Revolution in the north—a plan frustrated by his defeat at old Saratoga (Schuylerville).

Nearly all departments of the State Capitol. which cost \$25,000,000, are open to public several hours a day; also the State Museum, in the Educational Bidg., Washington Avenue, nearly opposite Capitol. The State Library is one of the best schools

for librarians in the U.S.

The Philip Schuyler mansion (1762), at the head of Schuyler Street, corner Catherine and Clinton Streets, was purchased by the State; open to visitors.

The State Normal College occupies an at-tractive site in an angle of Washington and Western Avenues, 1 m. west of Capitol.

Fort Cralo, one of the oldest buildings in U. S., was erected in 1642 as protection against Indians.

On the river road, a short distance south of Rensselaer, was a military rendezvous dur-ing French and Indian wars, and was used to some extent during Revolution. In a canton-ment, back of the main building, an English surgeon is said to have composed "Yankee Doodle," 1758, when British and Colonials were fighting together against the French and Indians.



vessel in New London harbor, and so frightened the British they offered a reward for Bushnell, dead or alive.



Dutch, from New Amsterdam, took possession of grounds at the mouth of the river, 1623, but were driven out by Pequot Indians; later they returned and called it Kievet's Hook. The town owns a called it Kievet's Hook. valuable Dutch copper box, taken from the grave of an Indian. Gov. Winthrop took ad-vantage of the absence of the Dutch, 1635, and built a fortification, from which he afterward defended the territory for the English. Town named after Lords Say and Brooke.



It is said that Waterbury has "Something on Everybody," because on every person who wears clothing is some button, hook, fastener, or attachment manufactured in Waterbury. The Mattatuck Historical Building has col-

lections of articles illustrating the early his-tory of Connecticut.

There is a fine City Hall of Georgian architecture.

The Silas Bronson Library is endowed by the New York business men of Waterbury origin.

The site where Rochambeau and his French forces encamped is marked by a monument. Button making was established there in 1850

by Joseph Hopkins. The town presented Lafayette (1824) with a

set of gold buttons.

During the Civil Wag most of the brass but-

tons used on Federal uniforms were made in Waterbury.

It has the largest button industry and the largest clock factories in the world.

The cheap watch made Waterbury famous. The New England Watch Company turns of

600,000 watches yearly. The Ingersoll Watch Company also has an enormous production. The International Silver Company is a suc-

cessor of the original Rogers Brothers.

Copper coins for South American countries and blanks for United States nickels are manufactured there.

On East Main Street is the Crosby School. Southington Mountain contains the Waterbury Reservoir.

Cook, Giraud Foster, Mrs. Alfred Vanderbilt, the Goelets, Robert W. Patterson, Morris K. Jesup, Joseph W. Burden, George H. Morgan and F. A. Schermerhorn; Lenox Golf Club notable gathering place for world's distinguished de-votees of the game; Lenox Academy, founded 1803, one of most exclusive schools in the world for amall children: Catharine Sedswick. world for small children; Catharine Sedgwick, first American woman novelist, and her brother first American woman novelist, and her brother Charles entertained literary lions of their time, including Lowell, Holmes, Summer, Channing, Bryant, Hawthorne; Jenny Lind, "Swedish Nightingale," was married there. In the "little red house," Hawthorne Road, Hawthorne wrote "The House of Seven Gables" and "The Won-der Book." The climate, now enjoyed by many, was the subject of violent ravings on the part of Hawthorne, who said "There was never ten minutes when it was not either too hot or too cold, the result of which was a mishot or too cold, the result of which was a mis-erable disturbance of one's system." He hated the community thoroughly and hoped somebody would lay the mountains flat. The wealthy did not begin to migrate to Lenox until the Court House was moved to Pittsfield.



Zadoc Benedict started the hat industry and in 1780 he produced "three hats a day."

For many years the hat business was considered very unsanitary and injurious to health.

The Hatters' Union is one of the strongest trade bodies in the country; they have been called the "Mad Hatters of Danbury."

For fifteen years they fought the Lowe Hat Co. and a final judgment in favor of the firm for \$300,000 has been enforced, with the re-sult that 186 members of the Union lost their property under the auctioneer's hammer.

There are fifty hat factories in the city, and they produce about \$6,000,000 worth of hats a ycar.

Jas. A. Bailey, a wit, known as the Danbury Newsman, lived there, and it is said to have been the home of Enoch Crosby, the original "Harvey Birch," a character in Cooper's Spy." ..







## Hartford, Conn.

HARTFORD, CONN.—Capital of the "Nutmeg" State, settled in 1633 by Tom Hooker, of Hartford, England.

The constitution for the colony is said to have been the basis for the constitution of the United States, and was written in the settlement in 1639.

The old City Hall was the State House for 130 years, and housed the Hartford Convention.

Center Church burying ground dates from 1640.

Wadsworth Atheneum contains the public library of the Connecticut Historical Society, and paintings contributed by J. Pierpont Morgan, who was born in the city and is buried there.

South of Park River, off of Main Street, a tablet marks the site of the Charter Oak, a hiding place for the Connecticut charter (1687), when it was sought by Sir Edmond Andros.

The historic tree was blown down in 1856. It was 33 feet in circumference.

The original charter is preserved in the State Capitol, which was designed by McKim, Mead and White, of New York. The sculpture on the north façade is by Paul Bartlett.

Stuart's portrait of Washington, now of priceless value, was purchased by the State for \$800 in 1800. It hangs in the Senate, where there is also a chair made from the wood of the Charter Oak.

There are many other paintings in the Capitol building, including a portrait of General Putnam.

Saint Gaudens' "Amor Caritas" is a replica of one in the Luxembourg, Paris. There is a view from the dome of the Capitol

There is a view from the dome of the Capitol building (250 feet high).

There are many points of interest in the city including the Keney Memorial Tower, Trinity College, Colt's Firearms Plant, a memorial to Col. Colt, Elizabeth Park and Charter Oak Park, Riverside Park, and all together seventeen parks, comprising 700 acres. Hartford was the home of Charles Dudley

Hartford was the home of Charles Dudley Warner collaborator of Mark Twain and Harriet Beecher Stowe, author of "Uncle Tom's Cabin." Col. Samuel Colt lived on Wethersfield Avenue.

At Broad Street and Capitol Avenue is the State Armory, one of the finest in the country.

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# New London, Conn.

NEW LONDON, CONN.-Settled 1646 at Indian village "Namelang," by John Winthrop, son of Governor of Massachusetts; once called "Pequot Harbor" and Thames, on which it is located, was called Mohegan River; early settlers were largely mariners and ship-builders, and until the Revolution the place carried on a large trade with the outside world. During the Revolution, the Connecticut Navy

(26 vessels) made these waters a base of supply and the warehouses were packed with British spoil.

The American fleet, which raided the Bahamas, carried its prisoners and prizes to New London and in revenge the town was raided and burned (Sept. 5, 1781) by a British fleet in command of Benedict Arnold, the traitor, who was born only a few miles from the town, at Norwich.

After the Revolution the port's shipping was destroyed, but for many years the whaling industry held its own.

There is a pier owned by the State and the government maintains an artillery headquarters.

as well as a naval and submarine station. The Harvard-Yale boat race course extends four miles up stream from the railroad bridge. In the summer there is a lively colony along

the shores and the harbor is filled with boats. Ferry to Fisher's Island, a summer resort.

One of the houses saved from the Arnold

fire and raid is the Shaw mansion, Bank Street; saved by tapping a tank of vinegar in the garret to extinguish the flames; now owned by County Historic Society.

On Main Street, one mile from Parade, is a restored mill, of 1650, built by young John Winthrop, who ground corn for the colony. Though many repairs have been made, the old wheel and other original features have been purchased.

The Race Rock lighthouse, Fisher's Island, was built by the late F. Hopkinson Smith, author.

Asleep commercially for many years, New London is wide awake and supports a large variety of factories.

Nearby: Quaker Hill, Oxoboro Brook, Mo-hegan Hill, Mohegan Settlement, dwellings of the last of the Mohicans (Mohegans); Ocean Beach and Cockegan Rock, one of the largest hundren in the mold boulders in the world.

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# Providence, R. I.





STATE OF RHODE ISLAWD.—Settled 1636, by Roger Williams; smallest State in the Union; "State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantation" is still the official name; first of colonies to throw off English yoke; founded by people driven out of the Bay Colony, Roger Williams being first to preach freedom of conscience and separation of Church and State. Narragansett Bay is one of the chief assets of State, making possible Providence and Newport; extreme length 47.5 miles.

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—Capital of the smallest State in the Union; settled 1636; a port of entry and second largest city in New England; situated on Providence River and northern arm of Narragansett Bay.

The Seekonk enters the Providence at this point.

It is now called the "Southern Gateway to New England" and its metropolitan district ranks sixth among American cities, in the value of the products of its factories, and fifth in the size of its annual pay roll.

It has 3000 factories, employing more than 50,000 hands.

It leads in the manufacture of woolens and worsteds, jewelry and silverware.

The late Robert Knight was the largest individual cotton mill owner in the world and controlled in Rhode Island alone more than a score of mills.

There are a vast number of notable landmarks and places of historic interest.

The city was founded by Roger Williams, the first American apostle of "freedom of conscience and the separation of the church and state." He also believed that the Indians had a right to their land and he was banished from Massachusetts.

With five companions he paddled around

the present site of Providence in a canoe looking for a place to land.

He landed by a bubbling spring, of which there are still evidences in the basement of house on North Street.

He was received in a friendly manner by the Indians, and named the place Providence in gratitude for his deliverance in time of distress.

He was hounded by the colonists of Massachusetts and Connecticut and finally went to England for a royal charter. While there he published his Indian dictionary. In the meantime those whom he had left behind drew up their celebrated "compact" which ultimately revolutionized civil government.

The ancient document is preserved in the City Hall.

The settlers continued in friendly relations with the Indians until the village was almost destroyed in the King Philip War.


It was rebuilt and at the beginning of the Revolution maintained a world's trade.

The Brown Brothers, progenitors of our national family, maintained nearly a hundred vessels running to China and India. John Brown and a party of volunteers captured and burned the British schooner "Caspee" (June, 1772), one of the first acts indicating the spirit of independence which was to follow throughout the colonies.

The men of Providence were the first to move for a Continental Congress in 1774. They burned British tea March 2, 1775, and

They burned British tea March 2, 1775, and in Independence Hall struck the name of the King from their charter, and stood alone as a free and independent state.

The modern institutions of the city are far too numerous to mention in a brief resume of its development. There are guide books which cover its points of interest in detail.

[2"] NEWPORT, R. I .-- Th fact that Newport is America's best known and most exclusive colplus the fact that the cottages of the **987**. wealthy residents are largely hidden from the blic roads, makes it a disappointing place to visit hurriedly.

It was founded 1639 by refugees from the Bay Colomy and was an off-shoot from a settle-ment established in 1638 on the northern part of the island.

In the two settlements there were 1000 in-bitants and they united 1640 as the Colony of Rhode Island; seven years later they united with Providence.

The Baptist Church was built in 1640 and is the second oldest in the United States, Providence having the first.

The first public school in America was opened in Newport and was probably first school "opened to all" in the world. In those days of every nationality was welcome at Newport.

The early merchants made large fortunes out af run, distilled from molasses from the West Indiea. They exchanged rum for slaves in Africa and the commercial keynote of the town

was "more run, more niggers." Prior to the Revolution, Newport had a greater foreign trade than New York, and its social importance was fully recognized at that time

The English fleet made it a strategic center, and this destroyed a commerce, which was never regained.

Trinity Church was the only large building the British did not use for berrack or hospital work, probably because its spire was capped by a crown. Its interior, with high pulpit, sounding board and old box pews, to-day give it an unusual Colonial atmosphere.

Rochambeau visited Newport with his French army and restored some of the fortifications.

On the authority of an officer of Rochambeau's staff the town was the first in this coun-try to introduce "afternoon tes. as a society sport.

The Dumplings and the original Fort Adams were built by the French.

In Washington Square is a statute of Oliver Harned Perry, hero of Lake Erie.

The old State House, now a Court House, was built 1743 and contains Gibert Stuart's full length painting of Washington. From a balcony in this building were pro-claimed the accession of George III and the

Declaration of Independence.

An old brick market (1762) still stands, but in a poor state of preservation.

The White Horse Tavern was built and used as a residence in 1739. From Long Wharf Washington and Rocham-beau reviewed the French troops.

Touro Street has the eldest Jewish Synagogue in America (1760). The street was named for the first Rabbi, Isaac Touro. The Jewish Cem-tery dates from 1677.

The Historic Society is opened daily except Sundays.

A part of Belleview Avenue was originally Jew Street

The Redwood Library, one of the oldest in the country, had for its first librarian an uncle of Sir Walter Scott. There are 65,000 volumes and many pictures, including portraits of early Indian chiefs.

In Touro Park is Old Stone Mill, the subject of endless discussion among antiquarians. Some have maintained it was built during the twelfth century. It has also been credited to the Norsemen. Others contend it was built by Benedict Arnold, grandfather of the traitor, for a wind mill, and that he described it in his will (1777).

The Vernon House, Mary and Clark Streets, was Rochambesu's headquarters; now a charity organization building.

Ft. Adams, on a point of Newport Harbor and Brenton's Cove, is a military post.

A torpedo station is maintained on Gost A torpedo station a second station and the burying place of many English Island, the burying in the Revolution. There is a local superstition that their ghosts rise and visit the main land.

The naval training school and war college for officers are on Coster's Harbor Island.

The first magnificent home of Newport was built 250 years ago. Among the early fasaionable visitors were rich planters from the South, particularly the Carolinas.

The cottages of the fashionables are almost too numerous to mention in a brief space. They of Mrs. Ogden Goelet; Wm. K. Vanderbilt's marble palace, now owned by Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont; the Wolfe-Lorillard-Twombly-cottage; the Breakers, built by Corneling Vanderbilt: the Breakers, built by Cornelius Vanderbilt; the home of Perry Belmont; the villa of Mrs. Herman Oelrich; the villa of Vincent Astor, the villa owned by Wm. Waldorf Astor; a picturesque stone house owned by Mrs. Jeseph Widener; the Henry Clews House; the Stuyvesant Fish house, the summer home of J. Pierpont Morgan; James Gordon Bennett's Therpoint morgan; James Gordon Bennett's house and many other homes, owned by people who are socially prominent, but whose names are not so familiar to the public. The Old Lime Rock Lighthouse has been

for more than 50 years in charge of Ida Lewis, who has saved nearly two score of lives. At Bishop Berkley's Rock, the English writer,

whose name it bears, composed "Alchiphron, which contains the familiar line: Westward the course of Empire takes its way."



[8°] BARNSTABLE, MASS.—Settled 1639. It is a pleasant, restful town with old houses and the oldest bell in New England, cast in 1665. Priscilla Mullens, to whom John Alden carried Miles Standish's proposal, lived there. Miles Standish, surveyor by profession, made original surveys of this part of Cape Cod. Once had a considerable whaling fleet. James Otis, orator and signer of the Declara-Independence, and Chief Justice tion of Lemuel Shaw were natives.

[10*] YARMOUTH, MASS .--- A typical Cape Cod town, once a whaling, now a cod-fishing center. buring the Revolution works were established for the distillation of ocean water and the manufacture of salt. It is a popular summer resort, and there are many Indian legends. Near Swan's Pond was an ancient Indian illust village, the burial ground of which may be scen.

[11*] DENNIS, MASS .- Indian name "Nobscussett"; first a fishing and trading point, later salt making center; famed for respectability of inhabitants, including many retired sea cap-tains. The Shivericks built fast sailing vessels early date; wild cranberries, grew in great profusion in neighborhood, were cultivated (1840); Indian legend regarding Scargo Lake, says whimsical daughter of a chief desired a fish pond; the women of her tribe scooped out one with clam sheels; the men filled the basin with water and thus developed Scargo Lake.

[12"] BREWSTER, MASS .- Settled 1860; on the

"ankle" of Cape Cod; a fishing village and rendezvous of sea-captains, active and retired. A collection of paintings, in the home of Capt. Albert Crosby, may be seen. Joseph C. Lincoln, author of "Partners of the Tide" and other Cape Cod stories, was born in Brewster, which boasts of the oldest windmill on the cape; named for the elder Brewster, of the "May-flower."

[13*] ORLEANS, MASS.-(Cape Cod.)-Settled 1750; of late years has acquired some notice as a tax dodgers' paradise. In five years the valuation of property increased from \$700,000 to \$5,000,000, at a rate of \$3.00 per thousand, during which time many local improvements, including good roads, were completed. Mill-ionaires flocked there in an effort to establish "legal residence." Some of them merely engaged rooms in tents or lodging houses. Stam-pede started by S. W. Winslow, a show machinery manufacturer. Township considerably cut up by the sea; on the east is Nauset Beach, which reaches to Highland Light, a distance of thirty miles; this beach takes in Pleasant Bay, the largest body of enclosed water on Cape Cod. A French cable makes a landing at this point. There are three wind-mills more than 150 years and contribution to mills more than 150 years old. Captain John Smith landed on the shores and left one of his ships for some time, under the command of Captain Hunt, who kidnapped a number of Indians and sold them as slaves in Spain for \$100 each. About the time of our Civil War, the Sparrow Hawk, an English ship of 1620, was uncovered by the sea, and an examination of the ancient wreck disclosed the fact that they was an examination the fact that there was a passage for vessels into the harbor, at that time, which was noted on the early English charts, but had been lost from the later charts. In 1717 the sea washed a passage across the cape between Orleans and Eastham, but with much labor the inhabitants succeeded in filling it up.

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[14] LASTHAM, MASS.—A Cape Cod town, settled 1644, on site of Indian "Nawset"; first white settlers, pilgrims under direction Thomas Prince; early ministers of gospel received portion of oil from whales washed ashore; Henry Thoreau says: "One could see divines sitting idly upon beach, waiting for salary to come in"; Nauset Lights on bluffs, with life saving station below.

[15°] WELLFLEET, MASS.—Incorporated 1775. It was the second landing place of the Pilgrims and once a whaling port, now a fishing village catering to summer visitora. "Wherever over the world you see the Stars and Stripes floating you may have good hope that beneath them some oue will be found who can tell you the soundings of Barnstable, or Wellfleet, or Chatham Harbor." Birthplace: Lorenzo Dow Baker (1840), named by his mother Thankful Baker, who began the West Indian fruit business which has developed into the United Fruit Company, with an investment of \$100,000,000 in the West Indian fruit business.

[16*] NORTH TRURO, MASS.—The bayberry, which is abundant, is turned into the bayberry candles to burn at Christmas time, for good luck. Nearby: Highland Light, one of the first marine guides erected in U.S.

[17*] PROVINCETOWN, MASS.—Eliminating the theory that Norsemen visited this point in 1006, which has by some been set up as a fact, the first visitors were probably a party under Cortereal, 1501. Gosold explored the section, 1602, and John Smith 1614. The Pilgrims sighted the tip of Cape Cod and anchored Nov. 11, 1620, about three-quarters of a mile from the shore, in Provincetown Harbor. The Pilgrims waded ashore and, while the "Mayflower" was at anchor in the harbor, Peregrine White was born on board, the first white child officially born in what afterward became New England. The historic "compact" was drawn

with sixteen men at Long Point. Some historians have said these gentlemen proceeded to rob graves as their first official act, but, of course, there have been many writers prejudiced against the Puritans. The place, pictur-esque in its location and by reason of large surrounding sand dunes, progressed immediately into a fishing and whaling locality, and is one of the most popular summer places upon the Cape. Many artists are among the summer colonists, and the local Art Association holds an annual exhibition in the Town Hall. Pilgrim monument (250 ft, high) stands on Town Hill; corner stone was laid by Mr. Roosevelt, and it was dedicated by Mr. Taft; said to be tallest masonry tower in the country, except Washington Monument, Washington. A curi-ous industry is carried on by David C. Stull, who buys all of the sperm from diseased whales at the fabulous price of \$500 a pound; less than two tons have ever been collected, and Mr. Stull has handled the greater part of It is the basis of a rare perfume. Cape Cod has been pictured as a fish hook with Race Point representing the point and Long Point the barb. West of Long Point is Wood End Life Saving Station. The great sand dunes called "Provincelands," There are which belong to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. These lands were once covered with trees, anu scientific forestry has been carried on by the State of late years. Many of the early settlers were lost in the sea, which naturally rages about the tip of the Cape, and makes the fishing business a hazardous one. The British fleet used the harbor, 1812, and it was at Provincetown that the British man-of-war turned over to the government Mason and Slidell during the Civil War.





Jefferson, actor. Gray Gables was the home of the Clevelands.

[4*] BOURNE, MASS.-Named for Jonathan

Bourne, son of Indian missionary; stands on site of Pilgrim trading station (1627), where Gov. Bradford met and traded with Dutch, of New Amsterdam (N. Y.); the scene (Aug., 1914) of historic pageant in which more than a score of neighboring towns celebrated com-pletion of Cape Cod Ship Canal, connecting Buzzards and Cape Cod Bays. [5*FALMOUTH, MASS.—Settled 1660; a Cape

town on the neck, between Buzzards Bay and Vineyard Sound; early a fishing town and supported large fleet of vessels. At outbreak of Revolution furnished four companies of militia under command of James Dimmick; April 2, 1779, they repulsed landing party of British fleet; war of 1812 Dimmick still held fort and when he refused to surrender his guns to British, town was bombarded. # Boston, Mass.

Böston, MASS.—Called "Hub of the Universe, is an important manufacturing cen-ter, being the home of more than one-fourth of the State's industrial plants. Shoes, shoe machinery, textiles, chocolate, confections and watches constitute the principal products. The city is said to be not only the country's great-est wool market, but the largest fish market as well, a single pier handling annually some 100,000 tons of fresh fish. Boston numbers among the world's foremost seaports, and boasts both the largest steamship pier and dry dock in the world.

Settled (1630) by Governor John Winthrop; and his followers. The latter, greatly reluced in number, were later reinforced by a group under the leadership of Isaac Johnson, who named the colony Boston, in honor of Johnson's home in Lincolnshire.

Made land gives the peninsula 1800 acres; the greater city contains 43 square miles, making it the smallest of the larger cities in the U.S.

Backbay was settled in 1860; it is entirely made land.

Boston Common (48 acres) has existed since the city was founded; the most con-spicuous monument is the Shaw memorial, by St. Gaudens (base by Stanford White), showing Col. Robert Gould Shaw leading negro troops into battle.

The Public Garden, containing 24 acres, presents a fine floral display.

The Old Granzy burying grounds hold the remains of Peter Faneuil Paul Revere, Samuel Adams, James Otis, John Hancock, and Robert T. Paine, etc. Kings Chapel (1749) is oldest church in

the city. British officers worshiped there during the siege.

Dock Square was the original center of trade.

Faneuil Hall (1742) was called the "Cradle of Liberty," and contains a collection of his-Ancient and Honorable Artillery, one of the oldest military organizations in U. S. (1638). The Custom House, on State Street, by rea-

son of its imposing tower, is the city's most conspicuous landmark, as well as the tallest building in New England. From the balcony which encircles the twenty-fifth story a splen-did view may be obtained. The four dial clock on the twenty-third floor is operated by electric motors and illuminated at night. Each dial measures 21 ft. 6 in.

Old South Church (1775) was used by the British as a riding school. It occupies the site of an earlier edifice in which Benjamin Franklin was baptized. It now serves as a museum for Colonial and Revolutionary relics. At Washington and School Streets is the

Corner Book Store (1712) the oldest building in the city.

Benjamin Franklin's birthplace was on Milk Street, and is marked by a tablet. A tablet at the corner of Atlantic Avenue

and Pearl Street marks the site of Griffins Wharf, where the Boston Tea Party was held,

1773. "T" Wharf is a fish market, especially live-ly Fridays and Saturdays.

Totton and Saturdays. Cotton and Samuel Mather are buried in Copps Hill Cemetery, Charter Street. Old North Church, Hull Street, was dedi-cated 1723; signal lanterns were there dis-played to start Paul Revere on his famous ride. Revere's house, occupied 1770, was on North Square.

The Old State House at the head of State

Street occupies the site of the first town house built in 1657 and twice burned. The present structure, dating from 1748, contains a fine col-lection of relics, and is open to visitors.

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A tablet on the Federal Building, Post Office Square and Milk Street, marks the point where the great fire of 1780 stopped.

The Public Library, one of the largest in the world (covering one and one-half acres), was erected in 1895 at a cost of \$2,500,000, and is said to be one of the very first of its kind in America. It is especially noted for the mural paintings in the Delivery Room, illustrating the Legend of the Holy Grail (by Edwin Abbey). The decorations in Sargent Hall by John S. Sargent are also well worth seeing.

Trinity Church, with the exception of the west towers, was completed in 1877. It con-tains interior decorations and stained glass windows by La Farge and others. For more than twenty years Philips Brooks, the famous preacher, was rector of the church, the founding of which dates from 1728. Harvard University, Cambridge, is the old-

est and one of the best known institutions of learning in the United States (1636). Massachusetts Hall dates from 1720. Other buildings of especial interest include the MineralogicaP Museum, Peabody Museum, and the Agassiz Museum on Divinity Avenue. On ex-hibition in the last-named building are the famous glass flowers, the work of Blachias. Their perfection defies even microscopic examination. Norumbega Park, out Commonwealth Avenue, offers incomparable canoeing . on the Charles River.

The Lowell House, Elmwood Avenue, was

the birthplace of James Russell Lowell and at one time the home of Elbridge Gerry, Vice-President United States 1813.

The Craigie House on Brattle Street served as Washington's headquarters and was later occupied by Longfellow, who lies buried in Auburn Cemetery.

Under Washington Elm, Garden Street. Washington took command of the American Army, July 3, 1775. Bunker Hill Monument (221 ft.) is on Breed's Hill, Charlestown district; the corner-

stone was laid by Lafayette (1825). In Charlestown burying ground (1642) are remains of John Harvard, founder of the

University. The U. S. Navy Yard is on Moulton's Point; British troops landed there before the battle of Bunker Hill.

Birthplace: S. F. B. Morse is on Main Street, near Thompson Square. The new State House is situated on Beacon

Hill. The central portion, to which wings have more recently been added, was designed by Charles Bulfinch. Certain sections, including Memorial Hall (which contains inter-

esting collections of paintings and flags of the Civil War), are open to the public. Oliver Wendell Holmes called the dome "Hub of the Universe"; in the house of representatives is the "Sacred Codfish," which Back Bay bluestockings are accused of worshipping as a fetish.

The Boston Massacre (March 5, 1770), be-tween town people and British soldiers took place at State and Exchange Streets; the spot is marked by a circle in the paving.





It was once a fisl town, and the home of the "Swampscott do universally used by fishermen. The scene Hawthorne's "The Village Uncle." At Blan Beach is a Town Fishing House, a munic institution, from which fishermen start of morning. North of King's Beach is the Mu estate. The "Old Puritan Road," betw Lynn and Swampscott dates from 1620.

[6*] MARBLEHEAD, MASS.—Settled 1629; oldfashioned town not seriously invaded by modern life; most of oroginal houses intact; older than either Salem or Boston; relies are Court, Powder House, and Abbott Hall; Corinthian and Eastern Yacht Clubs on Marblehead Neck, and locality sought by yachtsmen from all parts; has been called birthplace of American navy; was a center for privateering trade and harbor in summer is crowded with pleasure boats of every description. In the Town Hall hangs famous painting of "The Spirit of '76," by A. M. Willard, which has probably been copied and reproduced in greater variety of form than any painting in the U. S. Col. William Lee mansion, open during summer to visitors, designed by Bulfanch, drawing room decorated with hand-painted wall paper; Jeremiah Lee house, one of most elaborate of period (1768), open to visitors; Town Hall (1727), Marblebead's "cradle of liberty," where instigators of Revolution met secretly; in loft was organized Col. Glover's famous amphibious regiment of seamen, which led Contifental forces from Long Island, and at Trenton saved day by ferrying army across Delaware. Skipper I reson's house, not always shown to visitors, as the people of Marblehead resent insinuation in Whittier's poem, "Skipper I reson's Ride," which casts ignominy upon one of the town's respected citizens; house on Oakum Bay, near Glover house;

Marblehead was birthplace of Elbridge Gerry, patriot, "signer," and Vice-President of U. S.; home of Col. Azore Orne, who loaned government barrel of silver dollars, which it never repaid; district of Barnegat was harboring place for pirates and smugglers; John Dimond, father of Moll Pitcher, lived there and taught daughter, afterward "fortune teller of Lynn"; Fountain Inn, made famous by legend of Agnes Surriage, bar maid, whose story furnished Holmes and Long with themes for poems; the beauty of Agnes attracted the attention of Sir Henry Frankland, Collector of the Port of Boston; she became him mistress and in the earthquake of Lisbon, 1775, rescued him from the ruins for which he made her Lady Frankland; Fort Sewall, now public park; Robert D. Evans house, floated to Beverly and re-erected, was occupied by President Taft as summer White House; peculiar dialect comes from early emigrants, from Channel Islands; the first settlers were quick to fight on any subject; at close of Revolution, town boasted 100 orphans, 50 widows; more than half of crew of "Consti-tution" came from Marblehead; of 1000 men sent to the war of 1812, only 300 escaped death or imprisonment; when President Lincoln called for troops the news did not reach town until midnight, and shortly at daylight first company to arrive in Boston came from Marblehead.



[7*] SALEM, MASS.—Founded 1626; called "The Witch City." It was prosperous before Boston was founded, and was twice the seat of the State government (1628 and 1774). Its harbor had two very early forts, now crumbling to ruin. Prior to the Revolution it conducted a large trade with the East Indies. In 1770 it was tenth city in U.S.; 1914 visited by a disastrons fire, which swept away many of the historic landmarks. Watch Hill most noted point of interest; the old jail has knockers upon the door for those who wanted to get in; Court House contains records of the witch-craft delusion, which made the name of Salem known the world over, although the delusion did not originate there. Nathaniel Hawthorne born there, and worked in the Customs House; on Turner Street stood "The House of Seven Gables," which he visited as a guest of the Pynchon family, and his story of "The House of Seven Gables" deals with the family and its strange mode of life. The Witch House, in which many of the witches were tried, was the residence of Roger Williams, and was one of the oldest houses in the country (1630). Witchcraft delusion broke out 1692; a score of persons were executed in Gallows Hill Park.

The Salem Marine Society, organized in 1799, was composed of masters of vessels sailing out of Salem and who had "rounded the Horn.'

[8*] BEVERLY, MASS .- Founded 1628; at base of Cape Ann, by Roger Conant, tirst real estate promoter of New England; origin-ally "Yankee Sorrento." During presidency real estate promoter of New England; origin-ally "Yankee Sorrento." During presidency of Mr. Taft, called the "Summer Capital" of U. S. and ex-President still maintains his summer home. Hale Street follows shore many miles. Historic Society Building, home of John Cabot (1600); in house of Geo. Cabot, Washington had beaufast 1260. Incy Lascom Washington had breakfast 1769; Lucy Larcom lived No. 13 Wallis Street, occupied by Larcom theatre; home of Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes, theatre; home of Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes, Hale Street; also Parsonage of Rev. John Hale, whose wife was last person accused of witch-craft in New England. Other old houses, include 88 Cabot Street, built by Joshua Fisher, M. 



[11*] IPSWICH, MASS.—Founded 1663; overlooking Ipswich meadows; local historic society in Whipple House (1650); among relics is copy of "Breeches Bible"; number of ancient houses; modern factory element destroyed much of originality charm; canceing on Upper River and motor boating on the Lower River, with cruising to Plum Island and along Plum Sound to Newberryport; sun dial on Plum Island and sand at Castle Neck, believed to have been washed by the seas from the Isles of Shoals; extensively used for cleaning stone buildings; early Inns of Ipswich famous and have been subject of stories and books.

[12^{*}] ROWLEY, MASS.—Settled 1639, by Ere kiel Rowley is Egypt River Hill. The Dummer house and academy date from 1673. There is a mile stone on the main road dated 1208. Nearby: Parker River.



[13*] NEWBURYPORT, MASS.—Settled between 1630 and 1635 and has retained much of its early outward appearance; pride is taken in the preservation of everything antique. Located near the mouth of the Merrimac, it rose quickly to be a pre-Revolutionary shipping point. In Revolution ship owners turned their vessels into privateers and fine prizes were captured. "The Wasp" caught thirteen English merchantmen in three months; twenty-four ships took more than two hundred and thirty prizes and twenty-five hundred men; cargoes were sold at auction for nearly \$4,000,000. Whitefield, the noted preacher, died on the staircase at No. 11 School Street, with a candle in his hand, talking to a crowd of admirers who came late on Saturday night to welcome him... William Lloyd Garrison, abolitionist, and discoverer of Whittier, born on School Street. Whittier's sister sent her young brother's poem, "The Exile's Departure," to Garrison, at Boston. when he was publishing "The Liberator"; recognizing poetical value in the composition he published it. The wealth of the early settlers is illustrated by the legend of Nathaniel Tracy, mrchant prince (1771), who could travel from Newburyport to Philadelphia and stop every night under his own roof. During Revolution he owned a score of vessels, manned by three thousand men and carrying three hundred guns; and he sold his loot for more than \$4,-000,000. The Historical Society, 164 High Street, has a collection of old furniture. No. 201 High Street, was home of "Lord" Timothy Dexter. Mrs. Katherine Tingley, head of a theosophical society, Point Loma, Cal., was born there "Lord" Dexter was an ancient faker whose bump of pompous ego made him a notorious character. He posed as the greatest philosopher of the known world and did have sense enough to make money. Coffin House built 1654; first suspension bridge in the United States built across Merrimac.

"Buttonwood," built 1814, home of Historical Society, Whittier's two sycamores, which are 20 ft. in circumference and 80 ft. high, planted in 1739. In early days salmon were so plenti-

ful on the Merrimac it was necessary to insert in the papers of apprentices that they should not be fed upon fish more than six times a week; farmers buried surplus fish for land fertilizer each year, when all dogs in community had one fore leg tied up for three weeks (to keep them from digging the fish up). Dog were heavily fined. In 1697 Mrs. Thomas Dus-ten and her baby were captured by Indians, who, in the presence of the mother, dashed the Mrs. Dusten later baby's brains against a tree. succeeded in shooting all of her captors and making her escape.


[1°] MEDFORD, MASS.—(Boston Metropolitan District.)—A notorious "rum town," in early days, but, like the Blue Point oyster, Medford Rum comes from all parts of the world, and "the perfume of rum and molasses" has almost disappeared from Medford. The seat of Tufts College, near town line, largest Universalists' educational institute. P. T. Barnum gave the college a museum of natural history and the remains of "Jumbo," largest elephant ever held in captivity. One of Royall houses (1737), on Main Street, may be visited by appointment; in its day was credited with being the finest house in U. S.; Isaac Royall, West Indian merchant, built it, and during the Revolution it was inhabited by his son, who field to England. One of three Craddock houses in New England on Ship Street; local Historical Society has discredited genuineness of house, at least of its location. The builder, Mathew Craddock, wealthy London merchant, was Governor of Massachusetts Colony, and built three houses; Medford, Ipswich and Marblehead, but never came to America.

[2°] WOBUEN, MASS.—Settled 1641. Birthplace of Benjamin Thompson, Count Rumford, who rose from humble origin and poverty to be a world renowned scientist. He was driven from Concord, N. H., where he married a wealthy widow, on account of Royalist tendencies; fied to Europe and gained position, title and wealth. He founded the Rumford Scholarship at Harward. Nearby is the old Loammi Baldwin home, birthplace of the Boldwin apple, and Loammi Baldwin, Jr., first American civil engineer of note, builder of government docks, at Newport and Charlestown. Edward Johnson, of Woburn, puglished first history of Massachusetts Bay Colony. In Park Street Cemetery are buried the ancestors of Presidents Pierce, Garfield and Cleveland.

Home of General Benjamin F. Butler, Andover Street. Monument Square, memorial to first man killed in Civil War, during Baltimore riots, 1861; James McNeil Whistler, artist, born 243 Worthen Street; house preserved by Lowell Art Society, as Whistler memorial; Lowell named after Francis Cabot Lowell, who developed a power loom and other cotton machinery; Lucy Larcom, authoress, worked as a girl in

the mills, and her first writings were contrib uted to the "Lowell Offering," published by female mill hands. Number of Revolutionary houses standing, have been obscured by modern buildings. Indian chief, Passaconaug, sold the land on which the city stands. One of the drives is Pawtucket Boulevard, along Merrimac





The place contains one of the largest cotton mills in the world. It is driven by Amoskeag Falls, which has a drop of fifty-five feet; the Indians called these "Hideous Water." The textile mills there employ more than

20,000 hands in normal times and represent an investment of more than \$30,000,000. Manchester is the fifth city in the states in

the production of cotton goods and the ninth in the production of shoes.

The factories turn out about \$20,000,000 worth of shoes annually.

One of the features of the town are the corporation boarding houses for mill operators.

On the bank of the Merrimac is a monument to Gen. John Stark, hero of Bunker Hill, Bennington and Trenton.

Hon. Samuel Blodgett, the business pioneer of northern New Egnland, lived near Manchester; through his efforts was built the Blodgett Canal, passing around the Merrimac. Falls and opening navigation on the river as far north as Concord.

Five miles from Manchester is Lake Massabesic.

The Rogers Rangers were organized in Manchester and blazed the way for the British troops to stop the French and Indian invasion of New England in the days of boarder warfare.







Minute Men assembled, on it begin here." Minute Men assembled, on morning of battle, at Buckman Tavern, owned by Lexington Historical Society. Major Pitcairn, 600 British regulars, approached, Minute Men on the green; Pitcairn issued command "Disperse, ye rebels"; they stood ground, then came first shot from red coats, which killed eight Americans and wounded nine. This broke up the party and the Minute Men dispersed, in less than one minute, after which the British marched on Concord; on doorstep of Harrington House, Bedford Street, Jonathan Hancock, who was wounded by the first

volley, crawled and died at his wife's feet. At Bedford and Hancock Streets was started first Normal School in the country; near railway is Hancock-Clark house, headquarters of Mistorical Society, open daily and Sunday afternoons; was built by John Hancock, great-grandfather of the signer of the Declaration of Independence (1698); John Hancock and Samuel Adams were in the house on the night Samuel Adams were in the house on the night preceding the battle; Dorothy Quincy, John Hancock's fiancée, was visiting there; there was a price on the heads of Hancock and Adams, and a guard of Minute Men was control excision the heaven when Benne posted outside the house; when Paul Revere dashed up and told them "It was one by the village clock," the guard cautioned him against making too much noise, and it was to them he replied "You will have noise enough before large. 

In Sleepy Hollow Cemetery are buried Emerson, Thoreau, Hawthorne and the Alcotts. Statue to Concord Minute Men (by Daniel C. French) marks spot where the "Embattled Farmers" made their stand against British, 1775; two minute men were killed in one second; on return volley two British red coats killed; practically the beginning and end of the Battle of Concord; Red Coats fled, pursued across the Concord Bridge in "great d sorder." Dwight Tavern marks spot where Minute Men and red coats mingled prior to engagement "for inspiration." In Unitar an Church, as sembled first Provincial Congress; later used as secret storage place for Continental arms; old Manse built by Emerson's father; poet used the house as a boy, but it was later occupied by Hawthorne; Emerson lived in a house which he purchased. Concord Antiquarian Society Buildings filled with furniture and relics. Walden Pond, temporary hermitage of Thoreau.






and visited many times; characters in "The Tales of the Inn" were friends of landlord. Marlboro called "The Highland City"; claims greater elevation than any other town in State; Williams Tavern (1665), oldest in New England, was headquarters of Revolutionists, and court was held in the office, cells in basement for British prisoners. Nearby: Lake Williams. [7*] NORTHBORO, MASS.—Settled 1700, on the Assabet River; surrounding country is devoted to dairy farming and apple raising; many French Canadians in community. In the township is a fine stone arch viaduct of the Boston Metropolitan Water System. In 1884 the skeleton of a mastodon was discovered on the property of Mr. Maynard and is supposed to prove the existence of the mastodon east of the Hudson Valley.

Among the Wellesley College buildings are Fish Cottage, for students who Among the Wellesley College work their way, the Observatory, the North Lodge, and the Quadrangle, known as "The Quad," a group of dormitories built about a court. The new buildings erected on the site of College Hall which use burned in 1014 and of College Hall, which was burned in 1914, are those for which the college girls and alumnæ raised \$100,000 to supplement the Rockefeller fund. There are many pretty fraternity houses, and the Chapel is a memorial to Alice Freeman Palmer. All entertainments are given in the Barn. There are about 1500 students.

Was settled as a part of Braintree; John Adams' house is owned by the Daughters of the American Revolution; house of Charles Francis Adams, who was minister to England during our Civil War, standing. Adams Academy, founded 1823, was' the gift of President Adams. John Hancock was born on the site of the Academy building; Ruggles-Adams house built, 1640. In Hancock Cemetery are the remains of Rev. John Hancock Cemetery are the remains of Rev. John Hancock Centery to convey stone to tidewater to build Bunker Hill Monument. Stone from this quarry is still shipped all over the world. The Fore River Ship Yard is the largest in New England, and here were built the battle ahips "Rhode Island," "Vermont" and "New Jersey." Captain Wollaston established a trading post near Mt. Wollaston, 1625. While the Captain was absent Thomas Morton, on May Day, 1627, with his associates in the Fort, broke through the conventional lines of Puritanism, set up a May pole and danced and sang with the girls of the locality, for which Miles Standish and his army of eight men marched against them and scattered them in all directions.

[2°] HINGHAM, MASS.—Settled 1635; delights in being old-fashioned; annual exhibit of arts and crafts by natives shows handiwork which is done in homes, principally by women. The place was called Bear's Cove, and had three forts; Ship (1681), oldent wooden meeting . house in U. S., still used for original purpose and standing on same site; frame made from hand-hewn oak logs.

[3*] NANTASKET BEACH, MASS.—One of Boston's day-end resorts; equipped to take care of large excursion crowds. During the Revolution it was the home of Gen. Benjamin Lincoln, whose house contains valuable historical documents.

Standish lived near by; homes of John Alden and Priscilla overlook Blue Fish River; Alden home owned by Alden Kindred Association. All these characters, of Longfellow's "The Courtship of Miles Standish," buried near Standish home, built by old soldier's son; some of materials from original house. Points of interest: Wright Memorial Library and estate; terminus cable from Brest, France; Twin Gurnet Lights, on bluff; under bluff, life saving station; "Singing" clam beach; in the bay, Clark's Island, where the pilgrims of the Mayflower are said to have spent their first Sabbath.


[8"] MARSHFIELD, MASS. - Settled 1641: est known as home of Daniel Webster, who died there 1852; soil in community fertile and co-operative society of farmers ship truck to market nightly by motors; monument to Webster in triangle near church in main road; his old home, outside of town, overlooks Green Harbor River; house burned 1878; boulder marks its site; a small building, which stood near the original house, was used by orator as study and was spared by the flames; on grounds are two elms planted by him, one on the birth of his son, Edward, and one on the birth of his doubter Julia he forcesting and birth of his daughter, Julia; he frequently referred to these trees as brother and si-ter; Webster buried in family graveyard and stone is inscribed "Daniel Webster, born Jan-uary 18, 1782; died October 24, 1852: Lord, I believe; help Thou mine unbelief," and fol-lowed by his long theory on religion. 

WORCESTER, MASS.—Founded about 1673, on the Blackstone River. The Indians called it "Quinsigamond," meaning "pickerel fishing place."

It is now called "The heart of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts."

The value of its products exceeds \$100,090,-

000, and its payroll exceeds 20,000,000 a year. The manufactured product covers a wide field from paper envelopes to musical instruments.

It is an important art and educational center. There are some of the finest museums and galleries in the country, together with seven educational institutions, all of high standing. The Chamber of Commerce is a particularly active body. Through its efforts and that of "The Worcester Magazine," a city organ, the population during the past twenty years has

been doubled. Greater Worcester of to-day stands on seven hills.

One of the largest industrial plants is that of the American Steel and Wire Company. The wire business was started by Ichabod Washburn (1834), with six men. The hoopskirt craze, which consumed millions of miles ot wire before it died, boomed the business, and on top of that appeared the telephone and telegraph, so that the annual production of the largest plant in the city to-day exceeds \$20,000,-000 in value.

There are many points of interest. The Green was a training ground for Minute Men during the Revolution and on it stands a monument to Col. Timothy Bigelow, a Revolutionary officer.

At the end of the Common is the City Hall, with a statute of the late Senator George Frisbie Hoar, near the spot where the people of Massachusetts heard read the Declaration of Independence.

Washington stopped in Exchange Hotel.

There are many old houses, including the Lincoln, Bullock, Thayer, Burnside, Foster and Salisbury.

On Salisbury Street are the Armory, the Worcester Society of Antiquity, with a rare library and the Women's Club.

The Art Museum is the third richest museum in the U. S. It contains many priceless collections, including the Bancroft Japanese.

On Massachusetts Avenue is a tablet marking the site of the home of George Bancroft, historian.

Clark University, founded 1887, specializes in child psychology. The Worcester Polytechnic Institute, Boyn-

The Worcester Polytechnic Institute, Boyn ton Street, founded 1865 by John Boynton, specializes in the scientific management of manufacturing establishments. The Worcester Boys' Trade School is a


The Worcester Boys' Trade School is a model institution, emulated in all parts of the country. The Worcester Academy is another boys' school.

Many distinguished men were born in Worcester, or have lived there; among them were Eli Whitney, inventor of the cotton gin: Ichabod Washburn, who made the first piane wire in America; Erastus Bigelow, carpet machine inventor, Thomas Blanchard, machine inventor; George Crompton, fancy cotton loom inventor; Charles Thurber, typewriter inventor; J. C. Stoddard, inventor of the steam calliope; Aza Hapgood, inventor of the steam calliope; Aza Hapgood, inventor of the upper birth in sleeping cars. Elihu Burritt, "the learned blacksmith," was a resident. John B. Gough, temperance lecturer, began his American career by getting drunk and rolling in the gutters of Worcester prior to his reform.

Clara Barton, founder of the Red Cross; Edward Everitt Hale and Thomas Wentworth Higginson, lived there. E. F. Thompson, translator of "Omar Khayyam," is a resident.

Nearby is the Tatnuck Country Club, and Lake Quinsigamond, an amusement resort.



A church on the Square has a Paul Revere bell The Golden Ball Tavern dates from 1751; it was a Tory headquarters, and a British spy wacaptured there by the townspeople, an incident which led to the attack upon Concord. The old Connecticut path to the valley started at Weston, which was fortified by Winthrop, who intended to make it the capital of the Bay Colony. On the Sears estate are costly Italian gardens.

[4*] BROOKFIELD, MASS.—In the valley of Quaboag River; common presented by Bannister family (1773) as "rallying place for patriots"; General Court of Massachusetts granted land for town 1660; Indians prevented settlement until 1665. "King Philip" of the Nipmucks frequently attacked and killed settlers; 1675 town practically abandoned by whites. Rufus Putnam, Washington's engineer, lived there.

[5*] WEST BROOKFIELD, MASS .--- Settled 1665. In the library is a historical collection presented to the town by George and Charles Mer riam, who carried on a publishing and printing business before they moved to Springfield. At the end of Quaboag Park stands Hitchcock Tavern, which opened its doors in 1765 and has never closed them. Oil paintings of the first proprietors may be seen at the rooms of the Historical Society. Washington and Lafayette were guesta. The house in which Professor Phelps, the father of Elizabeth Stuart Phelps Ward, lived, is standing. Birthplace Lucy Stone Blackwell, one of the earliest suffragists, on Coy's Hill. At the top of the hill is a rock house, an Indian meeting place, with curious markings.

[6[•]] WARREN, MASS.—Incorporated 1740. The most prominent object in the town is a yellow brick Town Hall. The International Steam Pump Works has factories extending two miles. Manufactures: Cotton goods, paper and machine shop products.






Amherst connected with Shay's Rebellion in 1788. To north are Min. Toby and Sugarloaf; to east, Pelham Hill; to south, Holyoke Range; to west, Berkshire Hills. Straw hats extensively manu-

factured for southern countries from materials from China.

[3*] DEERFIELD, MASS.—Settled, 1667, by John Pynchon, who paid Indians at rate of four pence per acre; 125 settlers who followed Pynchon, suffered death and torture in King Philip war; during Father Rale's war occurred Deerfield massacre by French and Indian Chris-tian converts who killed forty of settlers and took 111 captives to Canada, killing furty more on the way, including wife of village pastor, Rev. John Williams; murder was afterward described by husband, who survived; he said: "The blood thirsty savage, who took her, slew her with one stroke of his hatchet;" tragedy occurred in Lyden Gorge, north of Greenfield; Rev. Williams on march of the captors to Can-ada preached the first Christian sermon in the Granke State at Greenfield; many of children of the murdered captives remained in Canada and became Catholics; Rev. Williams' daughter married an Indian; Williams house stands in Deerfield (1707); in Dickinson Academy build-ing is Indian collection of Pocumtuck Valley Memorial Association; Frary house (1683) oldest in the country, was tavern where Benedict Arnold stopped; Gen. Benjamin F. Butler born there.





There are two pre-Revolutionary taverns: Washing ton (1750) and Fowler. It was an early frontier town, fortified and went through heavy Indian fighting. Guns were secretly made in a gorge at the base of Mt. Tekoa for the Continental Army. Surrounding roads are de-

veloped from trails of trappers and Indians. Manufactures: Whips, paper and 20,000,000 cigars annually.

[2*] HUNTINGTON, MASS.—Settled 1760; near Turtle Bend mountain; originally paper mill village; local trolley company conceived idea of promoting agriculture and sent out demonstrating car among farmers; experiment proved of such benefit to community, increasing apple crop from 500 to 3000 barrels (600%) in two years, President Butterfield, of Amherst Agricultural College, co-operated with company and sent first extensive expedition in U. S., for better farming, with expert demonstrators.





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PITTSFIELD, MASS.—Settled 1743, on the Pontoosuc, meaning "Fails on the illage Brook."

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Geographically, the center of the Berkshire country, in the heart of the hills.

Nearby: Lakes Pontoosuc, Onota and Morewood. A country club has extensive grounds and golf course.

In the Longfellow (Plunkett) house stood "The Old Clock on the Stairs," which in-spired the nursery rhyme.

Hawthorne wrote at Pittsfield, and in the town of Holmesdale was the residence of Oliver Wendell Holmes, elder.

To the west is Lebanon Valley, one of the finest in New England. There is a view from the summit of Snake Hill, southern part of the city. In the distance is Greylock (1300 ft.), highest point in Massachusetts. other view from Brennan's Hill. There is an-

Nearby: Lanesboro; Cheshire, once the great cheese town; Dalton, owned by the Crane Pa-per Company; and Coltsville, where the paper for the government money is made; Shaker Village, Lenox and other pretty little Berkshire towns. One mile from Pontoosue Lake is Balance Rock, a freak of nature, cleverly balanced on another rock. Around it there is a public park.

Perry's Peak in the Richmond and Potter Mountains in the western part of the city affords a fine scenic panorama.

In Pittsfield was the church of "Fighting Parson" Allen, who led the men of the Berkshires to the battle of Bennington.

On the City Green (1809) the first American agricultural fair was held.

General Lafayette was received there in 1825.

Fort Goodrich was erected in 1756.

All of the present town except about 1000 acres was owned by the great grandfather of Oliver Wendell Holmes.

The first settlement was called Wendell's Town and Boston Plantation. The present city took its name from the English statesman, William Pitt.

In 1790 there was an addition to the colony of Lebanon Shakers.

In 1804 Messrs. Schofield and Rigby smuggled in some English looms and started man-Later they set up ufacturing broadcloth. power looms and manufactured broadcloth for President Madison's inaugural suit and sold it in the general cloth market,

There are more than 100 manufacturing establishments within the city, employing many thousands of hands.

The General Electric Company has a plant covering 78 acres and represents an invest-ment of \$30,000,000. They employ in normal times between 7000 and 8000 hands and have an annual payroll of nearly \$5,000,000. In this plant are produced three-quarters of the electric fans which cool the world.

In the government paper mill at Coltaville, four miles from Pittsfield, about 300,000,000 pieces of money paper are made annually.

In the town of Dalton the manufacture of writing paper was begun in 1800 by the Cranes. The head of the family, Senator Cranes. Murray Crane, resides there, and the Crane interests control practically everything in the town, and the Crane family has endowed many institutions there and in Pittsfield.

Patterson, Morris K. Jes-up, Joseph W. Burden, George H. Morgan and F. A. Schermerhorn; Lenox Golf Club notable gathering place for world's distin-guished devotees of the game; Lenox Academy, founded 1803, one of most exclusive schools in the world for small children; Catharine Sedgwick, first American woman novelist, and her brother Charles entertained literary lions of their time, including Lowell, Holmes, Sumner, Channing, Bryant, Hawthorne; Jenny Lind, "Swedish Nightingale," was married there. In the "little red house," Hawthorne Road, Hawthorne wrote "The House of Seven Gables" and "The Wonder Book." The climate, now enjoyed by many, was the subject of violent ravings, on the part of Hawthorne, who said "There was never ten minutes when it was not either too hot or too cold, the result of which was a miserable disturbance of one's system." He hated the community thoroughly and hoped somebody would lay the mountains flat. The wealthy did not begin to migrate to Lenox until the Court House was moved to Pittsfield.

[1°] SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y.-One of the principal summer resorts of the Empire State; seat of Saratoga County and the Skidmore University.

There are numerous mineral springs, some of ancient days and others of recent origin. These medicinal waters, which contain a great variety of curative properties, were well known to, and popular with the Indians, not only of the East, but of the middle West and southern Canada. They traveled on foot for many miles and spent months in the neighborhood.

During the Revolution the Springs were visited by such Europeans as dared to brave the surrounding savages who guarded the locality jealously.

cality jealously. Soldiers of the French and British armies visited the Springs as early as 1650 and permanent settlement was begun by Sir William Johnson about 1667.

After this period the locality began to grow steadily in popularity and it was early known to the Europeans, probably better than any other spot in America.

During the Revolution it was the scene of an important battle, Oct. 7th, 1777; when General Burgoyne surrendered to General Gates of the Continental Army.

The actual battle-ground was twelve miles distant at Schuylerville and there is a monument on the spot.

Prior to the Civil War the wealthy Southern planters traveled to Saratoga; camping on the way and carrying with them their entire families and many slaves.

About this time large hotels were erected and in later years the State government, realizing the importance of preserving the natural beauty of the Spa, opened a commission; and it is thought that the resort will be madein time to rival some of the famous Spas in Europe.

The Springs are privately owned and operated and many of the waters are shipped to all parts of the world.

Saratoga Lake, a small body of water, four miles distant, is one of the attractions of the community.

There are good drives in all directions and many handsome estates, notably Woodlawn Park, the home of the late Judge Hilton. For a time after the Civil War, Saratoga

For a time after the Civil War, Saratoga was a noted chicken fighting center. Birds were taken from all over the world and enormous sums wagered on the results of the battles. Legislation put a stop to the sport.

The next pastime of the famous Spa was gambling and horse racing. In 'latter years the best-known gambling house was that of Richard Caufield, who was the acknowledged king of the gambling fraterativ.

Gambling was done openly and it was the custom after dinner for the men to retire in evening clothes to the gambling houses, which were gorgeous in their furnishings and settings, and there play faro, roulette and other games of chance. Later in the evening the ladies visited the gambling house as spectators only. While this was in vogue for the evening

While this was in vogue for the evening amusement, horse racing was the proper thing for the afternoon and then driving for tea at the Lake or the larger hotels. The month of Auust, during late years, is the time, of, the horse-racing meet.

In the "little red house," Hawthorne Road, Hawthorne wrote "The House of Seven Gables" and "The Wonder Book." 

Hamilton went there to study engineering. Copper was found in the hills, and the first U. S. copper money was made from it; the works having been taken over by the govern-ment. The cannon for the frigate "Constitu-tion" was cast from these ores and General Knox was in charge of the works. Many experts thought the mineral deposits were the most important in the country, but later larger discoveries elsewhere overshadowed them. discoveries elsewhere overshadowed them. Nearby: Twin Lake, Ashley Falls and Lake Dunmore.





He hated the community thoroughly and hoped somebody would lay the mountains flat. The wealthy did not begin to migrate to Lenox until . the Court House was moved to Pittsfield.



The present industry of the town follows out the meaning of the Indian name in that it is the manufacture of taps, dies and reamers.

Near the river is a tablet commemorating the murder, by the Indians, of Mrs. Williams, wife of the pastor of the Deerfield captives, who were marched to Canada.

There is a public park on a mountain ridge east of the town.





Moody: conferences becan in 1880 and annu-Moody conferences began in 1880 and annually attract large numbers of Christian workers; Northfield Seminary founded by Moody 1879; the Russell Sage Chapel, finished in 1909, the gift of Mrs. Russell Sage; farm house where Moody was born (1837) stands, he became an evangelist while selling shoes in Chicago. On Clarks Island, in the river, are supposed to have been buried a pirate's treasures. It was known to the Indians as a good salmon spearing place, and when the whites came it was necessary for the red men to turn their spearing attention to the newcomers for a period,

-

which had a deteriorating effect upon a per-manent settlement, until 1714. Indians at-tempted to capture the town as late as 1676, when thirty-six troopers were sent from Hadley; they expected to be ambushed and were while eating wild grapes by the roadside; only sixteen escaped the hatchets of the Ind'ans.

Minute Men assembled, on morning of battle, at Buckman Tavern, owned by Lexington Historical Society. Major Pitcairn, 600 British regulars, approached, Minute Men on the green; Pitcairn issued command, "Disperse, ye rebels"; they stood ground, then came first shot from red coats, which killed eight Americans and wounded nine. This broke up the party and the Minute Men dispersed, in less than one minute, after which the British marched on Concord; on dorstep of Harrington House, Bedford Street, Jonathan Hancock, who was wounded by the first volley, crawled and died at his wife's fect. At Bedford and Hancock Streets was started first Normal School in the country; near railway is Hancock-Clark house, headquarters of Historical Society, open daily and Sunday afternoons; was built by John Hancock, great-








Cape Cod Detail Map



PLYMOUTH, MASS .- An interesting place to students of history. The "Mayflower" cast anchor off its shores

Dec. 21, 1620. arious reasons have been assigned for the selection of the spot and some prejudiced persons maintain the Pilgrims were seasick and had to land somewhere quickly.

The identical rock where the first Pilgrim set his right foot has been carefully preserved with a stone canopy to protect it from defacement and the weather.

There are records which place this rock on another sandy shore, but the landing of the Pilgrims there has been otherwise commemorated in the erection of a monument "In remembrance of their labors, sacrifices and suf-ferings for the cause of civil and religious liberty."

The principal figure of the memorial is a statute of Faith in granite (36 ft. high). At the base are figures symbolic of Morality, Law, Education and Freedom, below are mar-ble tablets in relief of historic scenes.

In Plymouth are some of the oldest houses in New England, including the Leach House (1679); the Howland (1666); Coles Black-smith Shop (1684); Shurtleff (1698); Crowe (1664); Harlow (1667); the material in the hatter was first used in an old fort, on Burial Hill. The Winslow House (1754) is a fine architectural example of the Revolutionary period.

In Pilgrim Hall is a large collection of relics, including the commission from Oliver Cromwell to Governor Wilson; the chairs of Brewster and Governor Carver; the Bible of

John Alden and Governor Bradford; Miles Standish's Damascus sword, said to date three centuries prior to the Christian era. The blade may have come down to Standish from the Crusaders. There is also the barrel of the gun which killed King Philip.

A library in the Hall contains volumes dated 1559, and there are some of the oldest State papers in the country. a copy of Eliot's Indian Bible. There is also

In the Registry Building is filed the will of Miles Standish.

In 'Cole's Hill Cemetery, the first Pilgrim burying ground, rest the remains of nearly one-half of those who landed from the "Mayflower," a majority of them were buried the first winter.

In order to deceive the Indians regarding the loss in their numbers the wiley Pilgrim survivors leveled the graves of their dead and planted grass.

Governor Bradford was buried in Plymouth. His home stood at the corner of Main and Leyden Streets, diagonally across from the Pilgrim Spring and near the site of the first house.

Among other points of interest are Town Brook, the Training Green, Watson Hill, Pil-grim Wharf, and the Miles Standish monument at Duxbury.

The Pilgrims spent their first Sabbath on Clark's Island.

They held their first jury trial in 1623, which would indicate that they were all good for three years.





Once had a considerable whaling fleet the word "Ship" was displayed on a tall flagpole. 

[6^e] ORLEANS, MASS.--(Cape Cod.)-Settled 1750; of late years has acquired some notice as a tax-dodgers' paradise. In five years the valuation of property increased from \$700,000 to \$5,000,000, at a rate of \$3.00 per thousand, during which time many local improvements, including good roads, were completed. Mill-ionaires flocked there in an effort to establish "legal residence." Some of them merely engaged rooms in tents or lodging houses. Stampede started by S. W. Winslow, a show

War, the Sparrow Hawk, an English ship of 1620, was uncovered by the sea, and an ex-amination of the ancient wreck disclosed the fact that there was a passage for vessels into the harbor, at that time, which was noted on the early English charts, but had been lost from the later charts. In 1717 the sea washed a passage across the cape between Orleans and Eastham, but with much labor the inhabitants

succeeded in filling it up. [7*] EASTHAM, MASS.—A Cape Cod town, settled 1644, on site of Indian "Nawset;" first white settlers, pilgrims under direction Thomas Prince; early ministers of gospel received portion of oil from whales washed ashore; menry Thoreau says: "One could see divines sitting idly upon beach, waiting for salary to come in; Nauset Lights on bluffs, with life saving station beleow.

[10°] NORTH TRURO, MASS.-The bayberry, which is abundant, is turned into the bayberry candles to burn at Christmas time, for good huck. Nearby: Highland Light, one of the first marine guides erected in U. S.

[11*] PROVINCETOWN, MASS .--- Eliminating the theory that Norsemen visited this point in 1006, which has by some been set up as a fact, the first visitors were probably a party under Cortereal, 1501. Gosold explored the section, 1602, and John Smith 1614. The Pilgrims sighted the tip of Cape Cod and anchored Nov. 11, 1620, about three-quarters of a mile from the abore, in Provincetown Harbor. The Pilgrims waded ashore and while the "Mayflower" was at anchor in the harbor, Peregrine White was born on board, the first white child officially born in what afterward became New

England. The historic "compact" was drawn while the "Mayflower" was an anchor and the next move was the landing of Miles Standish with sixteen men at Long Point. Pilgrim monument (250 ft. high) stands on Town Hill; corner stone was laid by Mr. Roosevelt, and it was dedicated by Mr. Taft; said to be tallest masonry tower in the country except Washington Monument, Washington. A curi-A curi-C. Stull, ous industry is carried on by David C. Stull, who buys all of the sperm from diseased whales at the fabulous price of \$500 a pound; less than two tons have ever been collected, and Mr. Stull has handled the greater part of it. It is the basis of a rare perfume. Cape Cod has been pictured as a fish hook with Race Point representing the point and Long Point the barb. West of Long Point is Wood End Life Saving Station. There are great sand dunes called "Provincelands," which belong to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. These lands were once covered with trees, and scientific forestry has been carried on by the State of late years. Many of the early settlers were lost in the sea, which naturally rages about the tip of the Cape, and makes the fishing business a hazardous one. The British fleet used the harbor, 1812, and it was at Province-town that the British man-of-war turned over to the government Mason and Slidell durir the Civil War.





[1*] OBLEANS, MASS .--- (Cape Cod) .--- Settled 1750; of late years has acquired some notice as a tax-dodgers' paradise. Mill-ionaires flocked there in an effort to establish "legal residence." Some of them merely engaged rooms in tents or lodging houses. Stam-pede started by S. W. Winslow, a show machinery manufacturer. Township considerably cut up by the sea; on the east is Nauset ably cut up by the sea; on the east is request Beach, which reaches to Highland Light, a distance of thirty miles; this beach takes in Pleasant Bay, the largest body of enclosed water on Cape Cod. A French cable makes a landing at this point. There are three wind-mills more than 150 years old. Captain John Smith landed on the shores and left one of his ships for some time, under the command of ships for some time, under the command of Captain Hunt, who kidnapped a number of

Indians and sold them as slaves in Spain for \$100 each. About the time of our Civil War, the Sparrow Hawk, an English ship of \$100 each. 1620, was uncovered by the sea, and as examination of the ancient wreck disclosed the fact that there was a passage for vessels into the harbor, at that time, which was noted on the early English charts, but had been lost from the later charts. theory that Norsemen visited this point in 1006, which has by some been set up as a fact, the first visitors were probably a party under Cortereal, 1501. Gosold explored the section, 1602, and John Smith 1614. The Pilgrims sighted the tip of Cape Cod and anchored Nov. 11, 1620, about three-quarters of a mile from the shore, in Provincetown Harbor. The Pilgrims waded ashore and, while the "May-flower" was at anchor in the harbor, Peregrine White was born on board, the first white child officially born in what afterward became New England. The historic "compact" was drawn while the "Mayflower" was at anchor and the next move was the landing of Miles Standish with sixteen men at Long Point. Some historians have said these gentlemen proceeded to rob graves as their first official act, but, of course, there have been many writers prejudiced against the Puritans. The place, pictur-

esque in its location and by reason of large surrounding sand dunes, progressed immediately into a fishing and whaling locality, and is one of the most popular summer places upon the Cape. Many artists are among the summer colonists, and the local Art Association holds an annual exhibition in the Town Hall. Pil-grim monument (250 ft, high) stands on Town Hill; corner stone was laid by Mr. Roosevelt, and it was dedicated by Mr. Taft; said to be tallest masonry tower in the country, except Washington Monument, Washington. A curr-ous industry is carried on by David C. Stull, who buys all of the sperm from diseased whales at the fabulous price of \$500 a pound; less than two tons have ever been collected, and Mr. Stull has handled the greater part of it. It is the basis of a rare perfume. Cape Cod has been pictured as a fish hook with Race Point representing the point and Long Point the barb. West of Long Point is Wood End Life Saving Station. There are great sand dunes called "Provincelands," which belong to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. These lands were once covered with trees, and scientific forestry has been carried on by the State of late years. Many of the early settlers were lost in the sea, which naturally rages about the tip of the Cape, and makes the fishing business a hazardous one. The British fleet used the harbor, 1812, and it was at Provincetown that the British man-of-war turned over to the government Mason and Slidell during the Civil War.

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

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



Mill-ionaires flocked there in an effort to establish "legal residence." Some of them merely engaged rooms in tents or lodging houses. Stam-pede started by S. W. Winslow, a show machinery manufacturer. Township consid-erably cut up by the sea; on the east is Nauset Beach, which reaches to Highland Light, a distance of thirty miles; this beach takes in Pleasant Bay, the largest body of enclosed water on Cape Cod. A French cable makes a landing at this point. There are three wind-mills more than 150 years old. Captain John Smith landed on the shores and left one of his ships for some time, under the command of Captain Hunt, who kidnapped a number of Indians and sold them as slaves in Spain for \$100 each. About the time of our Civil War, the Sparrow Hawk, an English ship of 1620 was uncovered by the sea and an 1620, was upcovered by the sea, and an examination of the ancient wreck disclosed the fact that there was a passage for vessels into the harbor, at that time, which was noted on the early English charts, but had been lost from the later charts. In 1717 the sea washed a passage across the cape between Orleans and Eastham, but with much labor the inhabitants succeeded in filling it up.

[5*] BREWSTER, MASS.—Settled 1860; on the "ankle" of Cape Cod; a fishing village and rendezvous of sea-captains, active and retired. A collection of paintings, in the home of Capt. Albert Crosby, may be seen. Joseph C. Lincoln, author of "Partners of the Tide" and other Cape Cod stories, was born in Brewster, which boasts of the oldest windmill on the cape; named for the elder Brewster, of the "May. flower."

[6*] DENNIS, MASS .- Indian name "Nobscussett"; first a fishing and trading point, later salt making center; famed for respectability of inhabitants, including many retired sea cap-tains. The Shivericks built fast sailing vessels early date; wild cranberries grew in great profusion in neighborhood, were cultivated (1840); Indian legend regarding Scargo Lake, says whimsical daughter of a chief desired a fish pond; the women of her tribe scooped out one with clam shells; the men filled the basin with water and thus developed Scargo Lake.

[7*] YARMOUTH, MASS .- A typical Cape Cod town, once a whaling, now a cod-fishing center. During the Revolution works were established for the distillation of ocean water and the manufacture of salt. It is a popular summer resort, and there are many Indian legends. Near Swan's Pond was an ancient Indian village, the burial ground of which may be seen.



PORTSMOUTH, N. H.-Settled 1630; an im portant United States Naval Station.

Many of the colonial mansions are still oceupied by the descendants of the pre-Revolutionary merchant princes.

Thomas Bailey Aldrich, author of "The Story of a Bad Boy," was a native, and in his book he says that many of the first families of to-day do not care to trace their pedigree back to the Matilda Jane and other pirate sea rovers.

The city is built on a peninsula, formed by an estuary which is sometimes called Piscatqua River.

On the sea side of Market Square is the oldest bank in the Unifed States.

The Athenaeum is a private institution, but visitors are admitted to the collection of rare books and early documents.

In St. John's Church (1806), replacing Queen's Chapel destroyed by fire, is a baptismal font of porphyritic marble with brass covers, brought to this country by an old sea captain,

1758, and presented to the church. He purchased it for a jug of rum, and it is probably the most valuable baptismal font in the United States.

There is also in the church one of the four "vinegar" Bibles of this country. The name

comes from the fact that the ancient printer spelled vineyard, "vinegar," in the parable. The bell in the tower was cast by Paul Revere (1806) from plunder brought from Louisburg.

The Warner House (1712) was the first house in the United States built of Dutch brick. The walls are of Oriental frescoes, which for more than a century were covered by wall paper, and only discovered by accident a few years ago.

On this house is a lightning rod set up by Benjamin Franklin in 1762, and was the beginning of a lightning rod craze which swept across the country and caused the destruc-tion of thousands of homes, showing that some of Benjamin's theories were decidedly off.

Thomas Bailey Aldrich was born at 35 Court Street. Many of the scenes of his immensely popular book can be traced.

The William Pitt Tavern stood at Court and Atkinson Streets in 1770.


Washington was banquetted (1789) in the Governor John Langden house on Pleasant Street.

Langden gave up all the rum in his cellar to support the American cause, and would have signed the Declaration of Independence had he not been busy building the ship "Ranger for John Paul Jones.


The Wentworth was the dominant family is Portsmouth during its early life, and there are three Wentworth houses standing.

The site of the shipyard where the "Ranger" was built is now a coal dock.

While Portsmouth was not settled until 1630. it was visited as early as 1603 by Martin Pring; in 1605 by Champlain, and in 1614 by Captain John Smith.

[1°] YORK, ME.—Settled 1624, now a popular summer resort, with fine marine views and a surrounding of deep woods. Nearby is Mt. Agamenticus, which has a lake at its base. One of the points of interest is an ancient stone jail which has been converted into a colonial muscum. The York Country Club has excellent golf links. One of the larger clubs of artists is called the Parnassus, and during the season holds regular Sunday morning meetings. The surrounding hills, bluffs and beaches have been water colored, oil painted and done in black and white until there is hardly a spot left which has not been overworked. Exhibitions are held by the well known artists in the village studio of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin R. White. It is difficult in the summer to motor through the place without running down some famous, abstracted artist, who is crossing the road on the bias.







Concord is the starting point for numerous trips to the mountain and lake regions of New Hampshire.


The city and river have attracted many painters and the town has long been commercially active.

On Clarks Island, in the river, are supposed to have been buried a pirate's treasures. It was known to the Indians as a good salmon spearing place, and when the whites came it was necessary for the red men to turn their spearing attention to the newcomers for a period which had a deteriorating effect upon a permanent settlement, until 1714. Indians at-tempted to capture the town as late as 1676, when thirty-six troopers were sent from Hadley; they expected to be ambushed and were while eating wild grapes by the roadside; only sixteen escaped the hatchets of the Indians.

First houses built of logs with portholes in the walls. Nearby: Mt. Hermon School, founded 1881. noted for industrial features. The Me-1881, noted for industrial features. morial Chapel erected with funds raised by friends of Dwight L. Moody, evangelist.

# Che MOUNT PLEASANT



BARTTON WOODS, N. H. — A famous summer resort; is the chief route terminus, though little more than a station with two magnificent hotels-"The Mount Pleasant" as "The Mount Washington"-separated by and level valley laid out as a golf course-splendid views from the porches of either hotel. There are many pleasant walks to the neighboring streams and mountains. Mt. Washington (6293 ft.), is the highest peak east of the Rockies or north of the great ranges in the Carolinas; it was venerated by Indians as abode of the "Great Spirit"; Sachem Passa-conaway chief of the Merrimacs, who lived to be 120, was a Demi-God of the White Hills; Darby Field, Irish soldier, the first white man to ascend Mt. Washington (1642), accompanied by two Indians, and in honor of whom Mount Field is named; in his account of the trip, Field spoke of the mountains as "The Chrystall Hills." The Appalachian Mountain Club, of Boston, has marked many trails over these peaks; "Appalachia," published by the club, is a valuable guide to mountain climbers. The Federal government has acquired 260,000 acres for a National Park; it is now proposed to treble this area. A Cog road up Mt. Wash-ington, built 1869, has maximum grade of 2000 ft. to the mile; "Tip Top House" is chained to the rocks; the view, when the clouds are not below the peaks, covers five States and reaches into the Province of Oue. States and reaches into the Province of Que-bec. Three miles to the south lies Crawford House, which faces a small lake, the source of the Saco River, flowing south through the fa-mous Crawford Notch, named for an early settler; monument near the Mount Washington House. The old Notch House at the gate of House. Ine old worth frome at the gate on the Notch was burned in 1856. On the right is Mount Tom Crawford, named for the pro-prietor of the old Notch House. Beyond is Mount Willey (4261 ft.), famous for the ava-lanche which destroyed the Willey family in 1826. From the front of the Crawford is a On the right fine view of the narrowest part of the pass, the cliff on the left being called "Elephant's Head" The elevation at the summit of the (view). The elevation at the summit of the pass is 1920 feet, and here divide the waters of Long Island Sound and the Gulf of Maine.

The first road through the pass was built in 1803, and in the succeeding years has been greatly improved, but a much better view of the mountains and the Notch can be had from the train than by auto. Among the interesting points around the Notch are the Pulpit, the Dismal Pool, the Flume and Silver Cascades, and the Devil's Den. Farther down the valley is Bemis, on Nancy's Brook, named for a girl who followed her runaway lover down the Notch and periaked in the snow by the brook. The stone cottage on the right was built by Dr. Bemis, an erratic Boston dentist, who willed it to the man who had taken care of him and his property.


MOUNT WASHINGTON, N. H.—Most widely advertised of peaks in Presidential Range; a road runs to the top from Glen Cottage, on east side of mountain; distance eight miles, rise 4600 feet, at average grade of 16%. The "Climb to the Clouds," as it is called, is taken by some visitors. There are several rises of 20% before the Half-Way House is reached. At four miles the timber line is passed. The grades from this point are not difficult, but careful driving is necessary. If the day is clear, and the clouds are hanging higher than the mountain top, the view is practically a map of upper New England. Cars are allowed to make the ascent every day in the week after July 1st, toll \$4 for machines of greater horse power, \$3 charge of eighty cents for each passenger. The road is owned by Libby & Sons, lumbermen, of Gorham, New Hampsbire, and even at the charge is not a money making investment.


Intervale and the Conways are beautifully situated in the widening valley of the Saco and are favorite resorts for those who wish to combine the restfulness of the valley with the inspiring view of the majestic Presidential Range. Pleasant walks may be taken to Echo Lake at the foot of White Mountain ledge, Diana's Baths, Mount Kearsarge (Pequawket 3,270 feet) command a fine view. Returning up the valley, we may turn right to Jackson, situated in one of the most picturesque of the lesser groups of mountains, where are many fine walks and drives. Continuing north on the course of the proposed trunk line highway north along the Ellis River, we ascend Pinkham Notch, recently improved and made a State road. Glen House, built on the site of the more pretentious hotel destroyed by fire in 1894, is the starting point for the ascent of Mount Washington by carriage road-a splendid piece of engineering, ascending with average grades of 600 feet to the mile.

Descending the Peabody eight miles we come to-Gorham, on the Androscoggin, a restful and beautiful town of about 2,500 inhabitants, 800 feet above sea level, the nearest village to the summit of Mount Washington, and long known as the "gateway" to the mountain region. For many seasons it was the summer home of the Rev. Thomas Starr King, author of "The White Hills." It is the favorite headquarters of the constantly increasing army of mountain climbers. Its Alpine surroundings, pure water and invigorating atmosphere render it an ideal resort.

At Randolph is a fine view of Mount Adams (5,805 feet) on the left, and here is the be-ginning of one of the easiest and shortest trails to the summit of Presidential Range. Jefferson, on a spur of the Starr King Mountain (3,919 feet), boasts of a splendid hotel, and the views of the mountains across the valley are very fine. There is a path to the summit of Mount Starr King, and other pleasant walks and drives invite the tourist. Lancaster and Whitefield are on the northern outskirts of the White Mountains, and command splendid the white monitons, and command spinlar views. Bethlehem, on an elevated plateau, reached by a long elimb from the river, is a picturesque village at the foot of Mount Agassiz (2,394 feet)—view tower 25c. Maplewood, two miles east, is also a popular tourist center. See the famous Casino and hillside golf course. Here roads diverge for Whitefield and Franconia. Perhaps the best views of the Presidential Range may be obtained from the summit of Ore Hill, near Sugar Hill Village.

The Profile House at the north end of Franconia Notch is, in the opinion of many, located in the most picturesque spot in the mountains. It is the terminus of the narrow-gauge railway which runs from Bethlehem Junction. Rising sheer on the south is Mount Cannon or Profile Mountain (4107 feet). Opposite frown-ingly stands Eagle Cliff, the awesome bluff which fronts Echo Lake and gives the famous echoes. A steep path leads to the top of Mount Cannon-view. Profile Ledges afford the best point of view; seen from the road, these ledges form the profile of the "Old Man of the Mountain," mentioned in Hawthorne's "Great Stone Face." Below the Profile House the road runs through a narrow valley to the Flume House, at the base of Mount Pemigewasset (2,563 feet). A half-mile to the east is the flume, a rocky gorge 700 feet long and 70 feet high.

A friend who was heading for the tall timbers dropped a note for the General, he made his escape and subsequently reached the Continental Army.

[5*] BRADFORD, VT.-Settled 1765, at con-fluence of Wait and Connecticut Rivers; pleasant drive along Wait River to Roaring Rock. Admiral Chas. E. Clark, commander Battleship "Oregon," when she made her historic trip around Cape Horn, during the Span-To ish American War, was born in Bourne. Battery Park, now a United States Military reservation, was the scene of a British defeat, June 13, 1813.

In the Harbor is "Rock Dunder," which was the boundary mark between the Six Nations and Canadian Indians. The legend says the name "Dunder" was taken from a remark made by a Dutch gun boat commander, who mistook the

obstruction for a French sloop and blazed

away at it until he discovered it was "rock by_dunder."

In the college library is a rare collection of Scandinavian literature, left by Geo. P. Marsh, the Norse scholar.

In Williams's Science Hall is the Pringle Collection of 100,000 specimens, representing practically all the known flora of North America.

From Old Mill, in the college grounds, there is a view and another one from Overledge Outlook, covering 45 towns in Champlain Valley and seven peaks of the Adirondacks.



The Federal Government maintains a Custom House; one of the industries is the handling of dressed lumber; the lake, called by the In-clians, "The Waters of Abundance," is 30 miles

long and has a maximum width of 4 miles; most of it is within the Canadian border. Owl's Head, 12 miles distant (3270 ft.), and affords extensive view; in a crevice, of the mountain the Masons hold an annual service which attracts many visitors. Nearby: St. Frances and Chaugiere Rivers and numerous hills, including Jay Peak, which affords a view of the lake.

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
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Portland, Me.



PORTLAND, ME.-Settled 1633; called Forest City"; the metropolis of Maine, lo-ated on a hill which forms a peninsula into Casco Bay; its land-locked harbor is one of the deepest and most commodious on the Atlantic Coast.

When the St. Lawrence River is frozen Portland is an important point for Canadian com-merce; chief exports potatoes, grain, lumber, coal. salt and china clay.

The city has nearly three hundred manufacturing establishments, some of which are the largest in their line in the world.

The wholesale section occupies the water front and the retail section centers around Congress Street.

Much of its early charm has been routed out by modern business, but it still retains some of the dignity of the past,

Among the well known people who were born in Portland was Silas H. K. Curtis, the Philadelphia publisher.

In the eastern cemetery are many heroes of French and Indian battles.

Commodore Edward Treble, who commanded the American fleet at Tripoli (1804), and who has been called the "Father of the American " is buried there with other naval heroes. Navy,

[4°] OGUNQUIT, ME.--Until a quarter of a century ago Ogunquit was an obscure fishing village, but it has attracted a large colony of artists from various parts of the country, who have built bungalows and studios. The beach, about three miles long, has garnet colored sands, which give it an attractive and unusual display of color in the sunlight. The Ogunquit River flows into the sea at Israels Head. One of the larger clubs of artists is called the Parnassus, and during the season holds regular

Sunday morning meetings. The surrounding hills, bluffs and beaches have been water cal ored, oil painted and done in black and white until there is hardly a spot left which has not been overworked. Exhibitions are held by the well-known artists in the village studie of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin R. White. It is difficult in the summer to motor through the place without running down some famous abstracted artist, who is crossing the road on the bias.

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Pilot Road Maps of New England Explanation

Reference to the Key Map on the next page will show the plan of mbering the sectional plates, which are arranged in numerical order. addition to the number, each plate bears the name of the most promint place in the district covered by that section.

The white-faced letters and figures on the margins of the plates are r indexing and for assisting in following routes across from one ction to another.

The figures at the corners give the numbers of the adjoining sections.

Every public highway, outside of streets in cities and very congested stricts, is represented on the Maps.

BEST AUTO ROADS are shown by the heavy black lines, and wariably represent the most desirable roads connecting the larger enters and popular resorts. Complete running directions for most of nese roads may be found in the text pages of this volume.

TOURABLE ROADS, or secondary roads, are shown by parallel ines, and are considered suitable for automobile traveling, though as rule not so good as the regular routes. These roads can be used in naking cross-cuts to out-of-the-way places, as détours in case of washouts, accidents or repairs on the highways, or for the sake of variety from the generally traveled routes.

UNREPORTED ROADS, or poor roads, are shown by a single line, and are not considered suitable for automobile travel. No attempt has been made to show changes in grade on these roads or the character of railroad crossings affecting them.

In following routes from one sectional plate to an adjoining section the directions on the margins will be of assistance, but care should be taken to observe the exact point at which the line leaves the margin, with relation to the white-face letters and figures, so that it may be picked up at the corresponding point on the adjoining section.

These sections represent approximately 56,100 square miles, and it is estimated that there are 106,000 miles of public roads in the territory.



ABSTRACT OF STATE MOTOR LAWS

CONNECTICUT.

Registration. Annually, Jan. 1, with Secretary of State, Hartford.

Fees. 50c per H. P., A. L. A. M. formula. Motorcycles, \$2, regardless of H. P. A pro rata reduction is allowed for registrations after March 81st.

Chauffeur's License. \$2 annually. Owner driving requires license. Licenses expire at midnight on last day of February.

Numbers. Front and rear; rear illuminated. Furnished by State. Must not swing, and must be 18 inches from ground.

Speed. "Reasonable and proper"; not more than 25 miles an hour for one-quarter of a mile. Ten miles at curves, crossings, etc. Car must come to full stop within 10 feet of any street railway car discharging or receiving passengers, and then proceed at reasonable speed.

Lights, etc. One-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise. Two white in front; red in rear, with white illuminating number. The use of siren horns is prohibited.

Fines. Varying, according to section violated. For driving when intoxicated, 6 months to 2 years.

Non-residents. Exempt 30 days, provided home State laws are complied with, and car displays two plates bearing the mark of its home State.

MAINE.

Registration. Annually, Secretary of State, Augusta.

Fees. Up to and including 20 H.P., \$5.00; 20 to 35 H.P., \$10.00; over 35 H.P., \$15.00; motorcycles, \$3.00. No one under 16 years allowed to operate car. Owner driving requires license.

Numbers. Front and rear; supplied by State.

Lights. 30 min. after sunset and 30 min. before sunrise.

Speed. 15 miles in built-up sections; 25 miles elsewhere.

Fines. \$10.00 to \$50.00, or 1 to 10 days.

Non-residents. Exempt for 30 days provided registered in home State.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Registration. Annually, with Highway Commission, State House, Boston. Fees. Less than 20 H.P., \$5.00; 20 to 29 H.P., \$10.00; 30 to 39 H.P. \$15.00; 40 to 49 H.P., \$20.00; 50 H.P., and above, \$25.00. Commercial vehicles, of a carrying capacity of one ton or less, \$5.00; for every additional ton or fraction of a ton of carrying capacity in excess of 1 ton, \$3.00 additional. Motorcycles, \$2.00. Motorcycles with side car attachment, \$5.00.

Chauffeur's License. \$2.00, and examination \$2.00 additional. Renewal, \$1.00.

Operator's License. \$2.00; renewal, 50c. The same applies to motorcycles.

Numbers. Front and rear; rear illuminated. Supplied by State.

Lights. Must reveal objects at 150 feet distance. Any light thrown directly ahead or sidewise shall be so arranged that no dazzling rays from it or from any reflector shall be at any time more than three and a half feet above the ground on a level road at a distance of 50 feet or more ahead of said vehicle, and said light shall be sufficient to enable the operator of the motor vehicle to see any person, vehicle, or substantial object upon the roadway or side thereof, for 10 feet on each side of the motor vehicle 10 feet ahead of said vehicle. Lights must be lighted one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise.

Speed. "Reasonable and proper"; 8 miles on curves, crossings, etc.; 15 miles in thickly settled sections; elsewhere, 20 miles.

Fines. First offense, \$10.00 to \$25.00; second offense, \$25.00 to \$50.00; third and subsequent offenses, \$50.00 to \$100.00 and revocation of license.

Non-Residents. Exempt from registration, but this exemption is operative only to the extent that under the laws of the state of his residence like exemptions and privileges are granted to motor vehicles of residents of Massachusetts. A non-resident, however, is defined as a person who has no regular place of business or abode in Massachusetts for more than 30 days in the calendar year.

NEW BRUNSWICK, CANADA.

Registration Fee. \$5.00. Paid to the Secretary of the Department of Public Works, Fredericton, N. B.

Registration. Annually, with Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Concord. Fees. 1-15 H.P., \$10.00; 15-30 H.P., \$15.00; 30-40 H.P., \$20.00; 40-50 H.P., \$25.00; 50-60 H.P., \$30.00; 60 H.P., \$40.

Chauffeur's License. Qriginal, \$5; renewal annually, \$1. Owner driving requires license.

Operator's License. Original, \$3; renewal annually, \$1.

Numbers. Front and rear; supplied by State.

Speed. 15 miles built-up sections; 25 miles outside. Reduce on curves, crossings, etc.

Fines. First offense, not exceeding \$25.00; subsequent offenses same year, not exceeding \$100.00; third offense, same year, revocation of license for at least 30 days.

Non-Residents. Exempt for a total of 10 days in calendar year, provided registered in home State and displaying numbers.

NEW JERSEY.

Registration. Annually, with Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Trenton. Fees. 1 to 10 H.P., \$4.50; 11 to 29 H.P., \$7.50; 30 H.P., \$15.

Chauffeur's License. Annually, \$3. Owner driving must be licensed. Numbers. Front and rear, supplied.

Lights. Thirty minutes after sunset to thirty minutes before sunrise.

Lighting Devices. No white light shall be used, the direct rays of which shall be projected at a greater height than a parallel of four and onehalf feet from the road; or if projected at a greater height all dazzle or glare must be eliminated; and in order that this provision may be operative without hardship to the owners and operators of motor vehicles, the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles is authorized to pass upon any lighting devices and upon the equipment of any car, and shall for this purpose examine all lighting devices submitted to him. Some form of dimmers must be used.

Mirrors. Under a recent ruling, all motor vehicles constructed with a top are required to be equipped with mirrors.

The following paragraph is a part of a letter received from the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles on Sept. 16, 1916:

"The section having to do with headlight regulation was so amended as to require that no device dependent upon the will of the operator complies with the law. This amendment was inspired by the fact that many autoists would use a system of headlights whereby the driver from the seat could throw on the small lights in the city and use the big lights on the country roads. This is no longer legal unless when the driver aims to use his big lights the same will be so dimmed as to be non-binding. In other words, we now require that the lights must be the same in the country as in the city."

Speed. 8½ miles on curves; 15 miles, country crossings or within 200 feet of horses on highway; 12 miles, built-up districts; elsewhere 25 miles.

Fines. Vary according to offenses. See Part IX, Chapter 113, P. L. 1906, amended to date. For violation of speed ordinance, first offense, not exceeding \$100, or in default of payment, 10 days. Second offense, double that of first, or 20 days, and revocation of license.

Non-residents. Exempt for aggregate of 15 days in any one year if home State grants reciprocity. Same applies to driver's license.

Fees. \$1.00 for each H.P.; second registration, 75 per cent. of first fee; succeeding registrations, 50 per cent. of first. Horsepower computed according to the A. L. A. M. formula.

Chauffeur's License. \$2.00 annually. Owner driving must obtain license Numbers. Front and rear, supplied.

- Speed. 10 miles in built-up sections; 25 miles elsewhere. Prima facie evidence of careless or negligent driving sufficient to convict.
- Fines. \$1.00 to \$50.00, or ten days, or both; subsequent offenses, \$25.00 to \$200.00, or six months, or both.
- Reciprocal. Exempt for length of time home State Non-Residents. grants exemption to non-residents. At expiration of this period, the non-resident must register. He may then secure a special 3-months' certificate, at one-fourth the annual fee.

In a recent letter to this company, Mr. Guy W. Bailey, Secretary of State (address, Essex Junction), says:

. . . "We feel that we have a very liberal law so far as non-residents are concerned. It is the policy of the respective State departments to render every possible courtesy to tourists. The publicity bureau, which is connected with this office, issues from time to time road maps, hotel guides and other publications that are of much value to tourists."

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS, DOMINION OF CANADA

American Tourists Exempt for 30 days

American Tourists Exempt for 30 days Under a recent ruling, the Canadian Customs Department now permits American automobilists to tour (for pleasure purposes only) in the Dominion of Canada for a period of 30 days by simply applying to the Collector at the frontier port for a permit; it is, therefore, no longer necessary to obtain a Customs bond if the stay does not exceed this period. For a stay of more than 30 days but not exceeding six months, it is necessary in order to avoid payment of the duty to secure a bond for double the estimated duties, based on appraisement of the car by the Collector of Customs. Also, a deposit of thresome formalities of bonding, etc., automobilists may avail themselves of the special arrangement which a number of Customs Brokers have with the Dominion authorities, whereby they are able to furnish bonds and customs touring permit for a fee of five intended tourist, and is good for crossing into Canada at any point on the frontier without formality and also for re-entry into the United States at the same or any other port of exit. other port of exit.

UNITED STATES CUSTOMS REGULATIONS

Governing the importation of Foreign-owned, Foreign-built Automobiles into the United States

United States (a) Automobiles of foreign or domestic origin owned abroad and brought across the boundary line by the owners for their personal use may be admitted, without formal entry, for a stay of not more than 10 days, upon the identity of such owner being established by the production of a certificate from the American Consul of the district in which he resides, or a certificate from a recognised automobile club, or other satis-factory evidence. If the collector is satisfied that the machine is being brought for the personal use of the owner, he will pass the same and issue a certificate to the owner, which will be delivered by the owner to the customs officers at the port of arlt, and forwarded to the collector at the port of arrival. This provision applies only to automobiles driven across the boundary line. (b) If the stay be for more than 10 days and less than six months: In this case a bond is required for double the value of the estimated duty. Sureties must be resi-dents and citizens of the United States, and not less than two will be accepted; or such bond may be signed by a bonding company authorized to do business in the United States. Otherwise proceedings are the same as in the case of the 16-day permit.

Foreign owners of American-built machines must in all cases report to the Collector foreign owners of American-built machines must in all cases report to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry, but consular certificate of identification or bond will not be required. The usual customs certificate for presentation to the Collector at the port of exit will, however, be granted in the same manner as required in case of foreign-built automobiles.
